Welcome to the September 2005 issue of the Berkhamsted *review*

With this issue of the Review, I complete a year as your Editor. My thanks are due to contributors, advertisers and readers for continuing support, and we are all indebted to Tony Firshman whose technical skills have so effectively raised the production standards of the review during the past year. This anniversary had me thinking about continuity and change, and noticing several events during the last month that in different ways mark out the passing of the years in our parish and town. We have appointed a new Rector who writes for us for the first time in this issue. He will be, so far as records can tell, the 81st Rector of the parish since Robert de Tuardo was instituted by the Bishop of Wells in 1222. We have cut down a great lime tree in our churchyard where it has stood probably for more than 150 years. It would have been a seedling when Queen Victoria and Prince Albert visited Berkhamsted in 1841. And at the beginning of August, our church architect, Percy Mark, began his quinquennial inspection of St Peter's. He will go on to inspect All Saints'. His detailed reports will guide our care for the buildings for another five years.

Vision in Adversity

Father Luke commends the long view

review leader

At my work there are some archives. And in those archives are documents relating to the establishment of the NHS. So far, so boring. Until you look at the dates. 1940 and 1941. As the bombs

were falling on London and Hitler's invasion of Britain seemed imminent a group of people had the courage and vision to look beyond the war, beyond the immediate crises and start creating the kind of society they wanted Britain to become. A society where people could have quality healthcare at whatever stage of life whatever their income. Judging by the times of the meetings most of the sessions must have been held while the bombs were falling and the sirens were wailing. What foresight these people had.

And so to Britain in 2005. Suicide bombers in London, not once but twice. And strangely familiar – bus routes we travel on, tube stations we change at. The media are consumed by the crisis. Has any one been arrested? Was there a shoot out? Are there more bomb factories? The police and emergency services are doing a fantastic job. But was it just me or is the reassurance policing somewhat disquieting uniformed men sheathed in body armour and toting machine guns stride around Euston Station? There is a crisis but are we in danger of making a drama out of it?

Last Thursday I went to see a man. A successful business man from the Muslim community with good connections. He has a vision. A vision of quality state run schools in the most deprived communities of Britain. Schools where Muslim parents and Imams are confident that their values are upheld. But also schools that are not ghettos – schools where a large proportion

of pupils are not from the Muslim community. Schools that attract bright young Muslim graduates to teach. And where Muslim teachers feel confident to engage with the different traditions of the West not withdraw from them. It'll take five years to undertake the planning and gain the necessary approvals. Another five to build. And another seven before the first students leave. Even longer before these Muslims gain positions of leadership and influence.

As I listened to this I thought of the people in the bomb shelters during the war planning the NHS. While the media focus on the problems this man focuses on the long term solutions. There are certainly no quick fixes here. I thought of his vision and courage of trying to build a better society while the bombs went off. I hope those in power have the imagination to see while we have to deal with the crisis we also have to plan for the long term too. I hope that in fifty years time we will look back and say what foresight these people had.



Every parish profile that has ever been written asks for a priest who is approachable and has a good sense of humour; we believe that all five of us fulfil these criteria, but I suppose you must be

y favourite line in the television series version of *The Hitch Hikers' Guide to the Galaxy* occurs when **Slarty Bartfast** describes his job of designing the Earth. He said that he particularly enjoyed "the crinkly bits around the fjords". In the

feature film version that I saw recently at the Rex Cinema I was slightly disappointed when, in the Bill Nighy version of Slarty Bartfast, the line was changed to "the fiddly bits around the fjords". One should not tinker with a classic. But whether crinkly or fiddly I thought this was a funny line which highlights the nature of the joke which the whole book tells - that the earth and its landscapes were constructed with an intention and for a purpose which is not obvious at first sight. In fact, as the film reveals: the Earth is a giant computer whose purpose is to find the ultimate question - which cannot be found by "deep thought". It is significant that what is being sought is the question, not the answer. Neil Kinnock once told a similar joke (off the record) about his experiences working as a European Commissioner. It was, he said, like drawing a diagram with 'x' and 'y' coordinates "where x is the unknown quantity and y? is the question".

As well as telling a joke, *The Hitch Hikers*' Guide to the Galaxy is also science fiction. Whereas jokers highlight the question or rather the absence of a question, scientists look for "the unknown quantity", answers to questions that have been posed, solutions to problems that have been encountered. And the solutions in science fiction often become fact. At a site near Toddington a new natural landscape is already being designed and constructed. About a hundred years ago Sundon Quarry became exhausted and since then has been used as a landfill site. The vast hole in the ground gradually filled, at first with comparatively inert waste, and more

recently with ordinary, untreated domestic refuse. This waste land, covering several hectares, is being shaped and capped with a watertight lining which in turn is being covered with topsoil a metre thick.

When finished, after about three years, the site will be seeded and planted and carefully designed to look like a chalk grassland meadow complete with copses, hedges, footpaths and wildlife. The designers will first have to get planning permission though.

It is hoped that nobody will notice that patch of new landscape Bedfordshire is artificial. Of course, almost nowhere is our countryside natural in the sense of being an original wilderness. Human hands in each age have shaped it according to agricultural, economic and social needs of the time. The meadows, fields and hedges that we see emerged for a purpose which, even if it has now been forgotten, was not a secret and was not intended to be deceptive. They are what they are, even if their original function is lost. But Sundon Quarry is different, it will be a rubbish tip masquerading as a meadow. Its original function is to be deliberately hidden from view. Evidence of this concealment will be found though; in the flue pipe that will come out of the ground to release the trapped methane gas generated by the decaying refuse. This gas will be burned to generate two megawatts of electricity for the next fifty or more years.

Unlike the questing Earth of *The Hitch Hikers' Guide*, this reclamation project is a technological fix pretending to be nature. It does not seek a question but finds an answer and the answer is, unfortunately, a lie.

Berkhamsted's Hidden History

Heritage Open Day — Sunday 11th September 2005

Most residents of Berkhamsted know where the Castle, St. Peter's Church, the former Berkhamsted School, the Town Hall and Ashlyns School are, but perhaps they are less sure where **173 High Street** is, until we say, formerly Figg's the chemist, but how much do they know about the history of these important buildings. Many will have heard of the existence of the Dacorum Heritage Trust Museum Store but will have little idea where it is or what it contains.

Now there is an opportunity for you to spend several enjoyable hours filling the gaps in your knowledge. On Sunday 11th September the Berkhamsted Local History & Museum Society, in conjunction with the Berkhamsted Town Hall Trust and the Dacorum Heritage Trust, is staging a Heritage Open Day with opportunities for members of the public to visit various sites in the town, where there will be guided tours, and to learn more about the history of these places.

Guided tours of the Castle, the best example of a motte and bailey castle in the country, with an important history, and many royal connections, will begin at 10am, 12noon and 2pm. Assemble at the Castle gateway.

Guided tours of the **Old Hall**, formerly known as School House, the original building of **Dean Incent's school**, founded in 1541, & the 19thc school **Chapel** of the former **Berkhamsted School** (now the Collegiate School), Castle Street, will commence in **the Old Hall at 10am and 2pm**. Guided tours of **St. Peter's Church** will begin at **2pm and 3pm**. Meet at the West door of the church by the War Memorial.

173 High Street, now Claire Lloyd Properties, is open from 10am - 4pm. This is the oldest known urban timber frame house in the country, dating back to the thirteenth century. Small group tours will be available. For further details of exact times of tours please ring 865158.

Guided Tours will take place at the **Dacorum Heritage Trust Museum Store**. This Store, an accredited Museum, houses large collections of old photographs, maps and other artefacts belonging to the various history societies across Dacorum, most notably those of the Berkhamsted Local History & Museum Society and the Berkhamsted & District Archaeological Society. Housed in the former fire station behind the Civic Centre, it is accessed via Clarence Road. For further details and to book, please phone 879525 or email cpeet@dacht2.freeserve.co.uk

Booking is essential.

Guided tours will be available at **Ashlyns School**, the former **Foundling Hospital**. There is much of interest here linking the building with the original London Foundling Hospital. Tours, including the Chapel and the Crypt as well as the main building, will begin at **2pm** and will be led by those who remember the Foundling Hospital days. Please assemble at the entrance to the main school building. A guided tour of **Berkhamsted Town Hall** will commence at **11am**. Assemble inside at the top of the stairs.

We are very proud of Berkhamsted's rich historical heritage. Please do support this event. If it is a success, we shall include other buildings next year, and even incorporate a small exhibition. For further details of all these tours please phone **Jenny Sherwood** (865158).

THE LIME TREE VANISHES

Should we leave the churchyard as it is?

S o the lime tree has gone. It isn't possible to record its age accurately from the number of rings in the main trunk because the centre is rotted away, but it was half-grown in 1870, visible in the photograph forming the frontispiece of Norris's book on St Peter's Church (top left photo). Could it have been planted to celebrate the accession of Queen Victoria in 1838, or her visit to Berkhamsted in 1841? It could have lived for three or four hundred years, but rot, which seems to have entered thirty feet or so above the ground, had extended upward into the branches and downward throughout the trunk. Its felling was a dramatic display of the tree surgeon's skills. First the branches were removed to leave the main trunk bare and gaunt, reaching up to the height of the church tower. From our house in Cowper Road, I could see the trunk rising above the rooftops and at the very top, chainsaw in hand, the man who was about to start reducing it to ground level.

Now we have an uninterrupted view of the Court House from Castle Street and of the north side of the church, and we can see the other trees in the churchyard - a silver lime, copper beech, oak and cedar. In the upper part of Castle Street, for the first time for many years, the evening sun shines directly on the houses and, so I am told, curtains must be drawn across or blinds pulled down.

What shall we do now? Opinion is divided. Some welcome the wider prospect of St Peter's in its new airy surroundings and would prefer to leave the churchyard as it is. Others find the new vistas of Church Lane and Castle Street less attractive and would welcome a young tree to grow into the place of the lime.

What do you think? Correspondence welcome.





Jonathan Griffin i n t r o d u c e s recollections of the local bus service

review northchurch

Positive feedback from the recent article about Northchurch dialect gives us cause to offer a further airing of the village tales of "Hedgehog". This slice tells the tale of bus transport in and around Northchurch, and was originally published in the Northchurch parish newsletter.

With little involvement with local buses, the days of waiting for the 'twenty-to-five' with sixpence 'for the pictures' and a penny each way for travel seem far distant. Walking, cycling or firm's vehicles solved transport problems for me until redundancy at sixty-three. So not many tickets purchased.

However, personal knowledge plus *tales I've been told* can make copy for a Newsletter. Based at Potten End 'B and B' buses will be recalled by older readers. 'B and B' was the initials of the founders Bedford and Barnard; though patrons would protest it meant Bumps and Bruises! No doubt the wooden seats of these wartime buses prompted this name, as the hump-backed bridge from Aldbury to New Ground was traversed. Close by is Pendley Hill, where wartime buses had distinct problems. They pulled a small *trailer* where solid fuel was burned, producing gas for motive power, but sometimes passengers had to alight and walk the steepest part to enable the journey to continue at all!

This area around New Ground seemed to generate many other bus stories. The *double decker* had a conductor and on one occasion he left the bus at *The Cow Roast* to use the pub toilet, only for the bus to set off without him. The conductor hitched a lift on a lorry, which overtook the bus, stopped, and to the driver's amazement there was his conductor in the road ahead of him!

These double deckers had an open platform at the rear where an upright pole assisted boarding and the conductor often stood by this pole. A retired bus driver would recall that, after a few pints during a rest period in Aylesbury, he and his conductor set off for Watford, only to be stopped by police near Tring. "Driver, where is your conductor?" - "Back of the bus", he replied. "No", said the police, "He came off the pole and the bus at the roundabout near Aylesbury!"

Now, nearer to Northchurch, at Durrants Lane, a certain lady one cold winter morning was devastated to find her beloved cat dead on the step of her cottage at Durrants Farm. Knowing her husband would be conductor on a bus soon arriving, she ran out and stopped it, pleading "Can you come, our cat is dead on the step, can't leave him in the cold." "Does it matter now?" retorted a passenger, but the conductor left the bus, removed the cat, and Normal Service was resumed.

In response to the above article, Hedgehog then received a letter containing further bus stories of the 1940s, with the writer's consent to offer them to others. Hold tight please....

"I recall a regular, jolly, portly conductor who, when approaching Tring Cemetery, would call out 'Anyone for the Cemetery? If not now, maybe later!!' "

With the Durrants Lane request stop in mind, the writer recalled an anxious lady pulling the bell-cord (remember that?) several times, at which point the conductor announced "All right lady, no need to play God Save the King on the b**** thing!"

More comments concerned standing passengers, when the rule was strictly adhered to – so much so that even the *cat lady* of Durrants Lane on one occasion failed to board the bus as her conductor husband's arm barred entry. "Sorry, full up!" – words which left her astonished and stranded!

All long gone – on the 301! Thank you Hedgehog; Just the Ticket!
