

The Crucifix
Father Michael
Bowie reminds
us of its
meaning

Like Christmas, Easter reminds us that God is a player, not a commentator, in human life. We need the commentators – in sport, in politics, in the arts – but we all have a sneaking suspicion that they couldn't cut it in the game itself.

Christmas gives us the story of how God got involved; Easter tells us about what God did with that opportunity.

In certain types of fairytale or even some religious myths (I'm thinking of ancient Greece or Rome) this might be a story of God making mischief with human life – playing at being human. The *Rocky Horror Show*, if you remember that piece of seventies exuberance, was a science-fiction spoof of the same kind – aliens playing at human decadence. Interestingly, that story proves difficult to finish and, despite the wit and fun of what has gone before, dissolves into a rather solemn nihilism at the end.

The story of Jesus is the opposite of mischief or nihilism. It shows us God choosing to get involved, not with the trivia, but the difficult bits of human life. For this reason we look very hard at the cross in the week before Easter. On Palm Sunday, as well as hearing about Jesus being carried into Jerusalem on a donkey and given a royal welcome with palms strewn before him, we all join in reading the story of the torture and death of Jesus. On Good Friday we do that again, but this time in a service during which a crucifix is unveiled.

St Paul said we should *glory* in the cross, not be *ashamed* of it. He didn't mean pieces of jewellery or even huge crossbars of wood. He meant the figure of *Christ on the cross*, which we remind ourselves to take seriously and look at afresh by unveiling it in that

service. We must look at the cross with Jesus on it, not as an empty symbol, or we are in danger of forgetting that God cares about suffering. There on the cross we can see how God expresses solidarity first with the victims of torture and violence, not the rich and powerful. And there too we can see the beginning of death's defeat, if we believe in Easter and the resurrection. But that's the point - we don't properly arrive at or understand the new life without what came before it. Not looking at it can be a way of not facing the suffering which we can so easily ignore in other lives, near at hand or far away; not looking at it can also be a way of failing to accept that God cares about our pain.

I have a powerful if disturbing illustration of how this image can be misused. I would say that a plain cross doesn't tell much of story, but in Chile I bought something in the Bible Society bookshop which is much worse. It is a wooden cross, brightly painted. On it is depicted a little girl - a smiling cartoon sort of figure with plaits and, I think, wings. On the cross is written Baby Jesus, guide me with your light. To me that is a grotesque image; what it says about the Chilean psyche, trying to distance itself from the brutal Pinochet years, might be worth considering. Despite the inoffensive sentiment of the words, it is the opposite of a Christian symbol, because it cosifies and trivialises what Jesus did and suffered. It really says, don't worry about this bit, cut straight to the glory.

But if God is a player and not a commentator he wants us to know that he is with us in the pain and the awfulness, not to pretend it didn't happen. Whatever our pain may be, he wants us to see that he doesn't just offer us words in response. The crucifix is a powerful reminder of that — of how brutality and violence cannot kill love. If we distance ourselves from it, we distance ourselves from the new life of Easter too.

but if you were, then you would have heard Reg MU Parenting Programme



Overseas Fund. In his sermon Reg spoke of parenting, but not in this country.

It is easy to think that the difficulties of family life and problems with children are confined to western societies and the developed world. The Mothers' Union knows this is not so. MU workers in developing countries tell of the problems families experience in dealing with their children. The importance of parenting is often overshadowed by poverty, famine and illness, especially HIV/AIDS. Survival on a day-to-day basis, providing food and obtaining water, and trying to generate income, mean that time and energy for developing relationships with children, take a back seat. The MU's successful Parenting Programme, begun in this country for the Millenium, has become a world wide project. This began in 2004 when 10 people travelled to the UK to be trained as trainers. Based on the programme operating here, it has been adapted to suit local cultures and specific problems, and is currently working in dioceses in Kenya, Rwanda, Uganda and The West Indies. Now there are 180 parenting group in their facilitators working communities

On 10th December **Reg Bailey** spoke of the Parenting Programme in Guyana. Guyana is in South America, but in the Anglican Province of the West Indies. The Parenting Trainer, **Sheran Harper**, between June 2005 and July 2006, trained 28 facilitators to work with groups in their parishes and communities. Six of these are men,

acknowledging the importance of the father in parenting. Among the topics covered in the groups are What Children Really Need, Keeping Children Safe, Setting Love Limits for dealing with discipline and Keeping Sane as Parents. These and many other issues are

topics that concern parents the world over. Sheran reports that as well as benefits to family life, relationships between parents in the home and with colleagues at work have improved. This year there are plans to take the Parenting Programme to the Amerindians in remote areas of the country. Sheran is aware of the extra demands of adapting handbooks and additional travel expenses programme expands, but it is her fervent prayer that one day every church in the country will be equipped to run its own MU parenting group. In his sermon Reg Bailey said that all MU work is undergirded by prayer. Many MU members around the world say Mid-day Prayers in their homes or when meeting together, something Sheran Harper knows about and knows it supports her in the difficult challenges she has to face.

The future of the Parenting Programme looks promising; news of its benefits spreads rapidly and these extend to grandparents, aunts, uncles and those caring for orphans. How can there fail to be benefits as more and more people realise the importance of parenting, of spending time with children and the impact of this on future generations! In the wider community people of different backgrounds work together and bring stability to family life. With the support and prayers of 3.6 million MU members throughout the world behind it, the success of this programme should not be surprising!

luebells will soon **D** cover the ground across Ashridge and Hockeridge Woods with a hazy blue carpet. I always try to make an excursion into the woods at this time of year to see this display. One of my earliest childhood memories is of standing at the bottom of a wooded slope, staring transfixed at a shimmer of bluebells under a pastel green and brown grove of ash and hawthorn trees. It was not the poet's intended meaning, but it is this blue that I think of when I read the two verses from Housman:

Into my heart an air that kills

From yon far country blows, What are those blue remembered hills,

What spires, what farms are those?

That is the land of lost content, I see it shining plain, The happy highways where I went And cannot come again.

The bluebell lies deep in our psyche and is linked to fairy enchantments. It is said that bluebells rang to summon fairies to their gatherings. If any humans were to hear this bellring they would soon die. This is rather a frightening story for such a charming sight, but there was a time when forests were dark and forbidding places.

Now bluebells are our favourite wildflower. The English bluebell is closely related to the hyacinth and among many other names it has also been called the wild or wood hyacinth. It has been a protected species since 1998 and half of all the specimens in the world grow here. But now there are two other varieties of bluebell to be found in our countryside as well as the native bluebell; there is an immigrant Spanish bluebell and a hybrid formed from the two. The native flower has

a characteristic droop to the stalk and long, bell shaped flowers which hang to one side. The hybrid Spanish and varieties have straighter stalks and shorter, fatter flowers that are a lighter shade of blue. English bluebells also have a strong scent which is almost absent from the others. The native bluebell grows in deciduous woods, in hedgerows and under bracken. The Spanish variety is cultivated and is imported from Spain, Portugal and North Africa. It has been sold in garden centres and planted in gardens, from where it has spread. It tends to be found around towns and villages, churchyards and cemeteries, and it is spreading more widely still.

Since bluebells are insect pollinated, bees that have visited Spanish bluebells in gardens can visit nearby woods and pollinate bluebells there, giving rise to the hybrid. A survey of bluebell woods four years ago found that one in six broadleaved woodlands had the Spanish or hybrid version as well as the English bluebell. There is little or no evidence yet of the hybrid appearing in woods in Hertfordshire or Buckinghamshire but examples have been found recently in Oxfordshire as well as other counties.

As with other familiar features of our landscape, growing evidence of a warmer climate is leading many to fear for the future of the native bluebell. The Spanish and hybrid varieties will be better suited to a warmer, drier climate and, if the predictions of higher temperatures are fulfilled, they may become much more widespread, displacing the native. It would be a pity to lose the sad but smiling stoop of the English bluebell which for me heralds the spring and brighter, sunnier times ahead.



Currently we are expecting a deficit in the fund due to a shortfall in income.



sense of sustainability, Bruce Nixon explores the climate change crisis which we as a human race are heading into; a crisis that will threaten food, water and energy and is only accelerated by globalisation agenda of large corporations. And it is not just the physical climate that calls for us to reorganise our lifestyles. The social climate of international inequality needs altering too.

Nixon highlights the fact that 25,000 to 30,000 people die each day because they do not have enough food and water. Charity does not address the underlying causes. Richer nations such as ours, and we as individuals therefore need a fundamental shift, including perhaps getting used to less. Nixon draws upon the example of meat production. Global meat demand is expected to reach 327 million tonnes in 2020. The world is a living system similar to our bodies and this overly protein-rich diet is crippling both. The extra hectares of land, water, energy burned, chemicals applied to grow the requisite amount of feed to produce so many tonnes of meat is a dangerous strain on this planet. Is it time we ate a more balanced diet? Furthermore, the Organic, GM free and Fair Trade markets are leading a revolution and we all have purchasing power to protect workers in the developing world and choose products grown locally and sold with less packaging so reducing the amount that ends up in landfill.

Another example drawn by Nixon is plastic bottles. They take a thousand years to biodegrade and bottled water is no healthier

in Britain than tap water according to the Earth Policy Yet how Institute. many do we buy and throw away each year? Could we reuse bottles instead

turning them so quickly into refuse? Refuse is a big

problem for

us in Britain where we have one of the worst records in Rich Europe. A basic set of principles for ecological sustainability which individuals and families can institute as well as governments would be: reduce, reuse, recycle and repair.

Then there is Nixon's frightening question: what would be the cost of a gallon of petrol if cost to the environment were included? Nixon sees business as a transforming force and holds up some positive case studies. Arup is involved in the building of the world's first sustainable city. Good Energy awards bonuses to employees who reduce their carbon emissions in work travel and then there is Beddington Zero Energy Development in Sutton; a testimony to ecofriendly, affordable and attractive housing which offers ease of lifestyle without destroying the countryside. Greener buses and car clubs bulk out the list further.

This is an informative and thoughtprovoking read, even if it does make you wriggle a little bit in your chair! Presented in a text-book style and covering a range of subjects from history and politics right the way down to lists of practical steps individuals can take to bring about change in their homes and lifestyles, it also includes a section of useful resources and references. Whilst the author's tone sometimes teeters upon the religiously pluralistic, the call to respect the Living System as the good stewards that God has created us to be is one to which Christians can relate and respond with passion. All in all: a book with a vital message.

Christmas is so special - no wonder people of all faiths and none enjoy Nativity plays and Christmas carols. Secularists complain out of political correctness.

As well as inter-faith dialogue, maybe understanding of and commitment to our own faith would be helpful -

there is a challenge to check out our historic faith and make it personal Render to God as well as to Caesar!

Many people responded to the *Street Theatre* at the *Festival of Light* - better known as the *Live Nativity Tableau with Carols* at the *Christmas Lights Switch-On* in the market place just before Advent. We know that the disciples changed from fear and despair at the crucifixion, to joy and power after the Resurrection and Pentecost. The early Christians were bowled over by the conviction that the risen Jesus was with them

What a shame for people who only want to stay in the nostalgia of Christmas. What a shame for sceptics who shut their eyes to spiritual things. What a shame that **Dan Brown** thinks Christianity is based on a lie - made up by the Emperor Constantine. This might appeal to people who won't face the challenge of Jesus. What a shame that **Richard Dawkins** thinks that God has been imagined by suggestible, deluded

people. He ignores the spiritual, personal and historical evidence. What a shame for children if Dawkins followed his charity plan to narrow education and children's restrict natural sense wonder about nature and supernature! Church schools are

popular because of the high standard of allround education, culture and the Christian ethos of love, care and respect for all. Most Christian faith schools in the UK accept Darwin of course, but science does not have all the answers. God is in their equation, as far more than the supreme Intelligent Designer!

As a balance to Dawkins' book *The God Delusion*, I have found other scientists' books very helpful:

The Language of God by Francis Collins, who found God through his work on DNA and the human genome and The Road Less Travelled and Beyond by M Scott Peck, eminent psychiatrist. Both books are very readable and convincing.

The Risen Lord

Our cover shows the east window in the chancel of St Peter's Church. Its theme is the Resurrection and its central figure, the risen Lord. It was inspired by the Rector, **John Wolstenholme Cobb** to commemorate the poet **William Cowper**. By Clayton & Bell, it was introduced in 1872 funded by public subscription. Unfortunately, the poet, at the bottom of the window, and the dedicatory inscription are normally hidden behind the reredos, also introduced in 1872, a gift of parishioners in memory of Cobb's predecessor, **John Hutchinson**. It seems an oddly insensitive arrangement.

Have you ever what goes on in the tower when you hear the bells ringing? Just below the roof where the louvres are, hang eight bells and when they are all ringing, over 3 tons of bell metal swing through 360° every 2

seconds. All this i s controlled by ringers the some 40ft below in the ringing chamber, pulling rhythmically on the bell ropes. The bell's note is made by the clapper hitting the inside of the bell just before it completes its full circle of movement.

COLD, CRAMPED AND DIRTY

Margaret Burbidge describes maintenance work on the bells

Bell mechanics are quite simple and have remained largely unchanged for centuries, but every now and again some maintenance or servicing is required. For some time it has been clear that the clappers needed to be removed from the bells for attention and this would have to be carried out at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry in East London. All this was duly arranged for the week beginning 4th February 2007 and in order to save considerable costs a group of St Peter's ringers undertook the task of removing the clappers on the Sunday afternoon. To do this they had to work in a very cramped space underneath each bell. The clappers then had to be carried down the spiral staircase (some 87 steps) and loaded into the back of a car. Five tired and dirty ringers emerged two hours later, job complete.

Monday morning saw the clappers transported to Whitechapel, to the foundry where the original bells were cast (or made) in 1837.

Congestion Charge Zone, the clappers arrived at the foundry. They were

inspected and the amount of work needed ascertained. The plan was

that the work would be carried out within the week, the clappers collected on Friday morning and fitted back into the bells in time for Sunday service ringing. So driver and navigator returned to Whitechapel on the Friday morning, avoiding the dreaded C Zone this time, loaded the refurbished and newly-painted clappers into the car and retraced their steps to St Peter's.

Then the hard work began. All eight clappers had to be carried up the 87 steps of the tower, and refitting was more difficult than removing them! Again the work was done from underneath the bell with little light apart from a head torch, crouching in all sorts of odd positions to fix the clapper in the bell and ensure it would

swing in a straight line. The work was adjourned after about three hours. The motley crew emerged, dirty, somewhat stiff in places and with a touch of frostbite, for Friday 9th February was a bitterly cold afternoon. Hearts were warmed and thirsts quenched in *The Crown* before hot showers and baths at home, but the respite was

temporary, for the job had to be finished on Saturday morning. And it was - the team sustained this time by coffee and cake from the Court House, and the bells tried out to check all was well - and it was! Mission accomplished and one of the team was moved to say "Thanks for a fun (and worthwhile) couple of days!"



Prior to this another job was carried out in the tower. For a long time there was concern that the belfry, where the bells are, is open to the spiral staircase, and bells can pose a serious danger to the unknowing and unwary. So a locked door into the belfry has been made and fitted by our oldest ringer. It has a little window so passers by on tower open days can see the 3 tons of metal which produce the sound of bells calling people to worship at St Peter's, Sunday by Sunday through the year.

The December review included an article on the future development of St Peter's Church. Change is also in prospect at All Saints'.

ALL SAINTS' THE FUTURE

Father Michael Bowie outlines the way forward

that the only option to ensure the continuation of All Saints' Church was for it to become, ultimately, a separate church in the Team under Methodist leadership: that is the goal, though it

is not yet legally possible to reach it. But much can be done to move purposefully in that direction. A major advantage of this move is that the Methodist Church, which has no other place of worship in Berkhamsted, will take responsibility for the provision of continuing clerical leadership, which might otherwise not have happened. That is clearly a desirable outcome.

Why is change needed?

When Father Martin Wright moved to Reigate he was not replaced and we lost a full time priest in the parish. When I began discussing the future of All Saints' with the Methodist Minister, Paul Timmis, a year or so ago, it emerged that the Methodist Circuit will also lose a minister when Paul moves (summer next year). Meanwhile, the Rector of this parish has become a Team Rector, with oversight of four more churches and two Team Vicars, one of whom reaches retirement age in 2009 (which will involve supporting a vacancy, possibly of 12 months' duration). Towards the end of last year we were also put on notice that the diocese will require our deanery to lose another full time priest by 2016. As I expected, now that detailed thinking about that has begun, the most likely outcome will be a further decrease in provision of clergy in the Berkhamsted Team. There are clearly not sufficient clergy to staff all the Anglican churches in Berkhamsted and the Berkhamsted Team.

Why now?

My concern has been to avoid a situation in which All Saints gradually declined through ever decreasing clerical leadership: the timing of Paul Timmis' leaving is crucial in this, so I decided that we needed to do something strategic in which he could fully involved, and lead congregation. The discussions gradually widened from Paul and me to various other clergy in both denominations (including the Archdeacon and Methodist Superintendent), the Leadership team at All Saints', the Joint Council and the Churchwardens and PCC of the parish. Having proposed various options to those who advise us on structures it became clear

What now?

Much of the discussion (indeed much discussion over the last 30 years) has focussed on the desire of All Saints' to be an independent, self-determining church, something identifiable that people know they can *join* (and support financially). Since the two All Saints' congregations (Anglicans and Methodists) have been worshipping together as one congregation (about two years), a desire has emerged for a more consistent and coherent liturgical style, rather than the considerable variety from week to week which presently exists. These two concerns are clearly related. Once all involved had got over the initial shock which the prospect of change always prompts, the advantages of the new arrangement in these areas have been grasped enthusiastically.

For this reason the Leadership Team recommended that the first change, to be enacted as quickly as practicable, should be to a new pattern of worship, which should feed the worshipping life of as many of the present members of All Saints' as possible, rather than reflect, primarily, denominational prescriptions.

The date for the change was set as Pentecost this year because that is a significant and appropriate date in the life of the church, and because **Paul Timmis** could by then have run a course for worship leaders, to increase the participation of church members in the change and in leading worship, while also having more than a year in post to support those who take part.

That is what will happen first. Leadership of services will be the responsibility of All Saints' itself, led and overseen by the Methodist Minister, with Anglican Lay Readers and Clergy participating, we hope, monthly.

Structures and Finance

Change in how All Saints' relates to the Anglican parish and the Methodist Circuit both financially and structurally will take longer to negotiate and effect. The Joint Council has been asked to appoint two small working groups, one for structures

and one for finance, to recommend the best way to proceed. There will be further consultations with the Diocese, the Methodist Church and, inevitably, lawyers. It is not proposed to withdraw from the Sharing Agreement, nor will there be any sudden change of financial arrangements or structural relationships.

Summary

The goal, to make All Saints' a full member of the Anglican Team as a Methodist led church, has the potential to enhance its sense of identity and mission, building on long established relationships in the spirit of the Anglican/Methodist Covenant. We have started by working on worship because that is where any church lives, and how people encounter it. It is hoped that starting with worship will also help build prayerful relationships which will assist in the other more administrative tasks.

Our planet is warming at an unprecedented rate. Drought, flooding and disease directly attributable to climate change are already having devastating effects on the world's poorest communities

The View from Christian Aid

Christian Aid Week 13th-19th May

Christian Aid Week is a huge outpouring of generosity. It is a vital time for Christian Aid's work, and it relies on the donations of thousands of people around the UK and Ireland.

Aid and development are essential to Christian Aid's work, but in themselves are not enough to end poverty. Christian Aid believes that we must tackle the underlying causes of poverty — in particular the decisions that are made by those in influential positions in the rich world, whose actions can affect those who have no voice. Christian Aid believes that the Christian gospel demands that we do all we can to challenge injustice and inequality and work for a world where everyone is included in the feast of life.

Climate change is a social justice issue that we have to address if we are serious about ending poverty. Scientists are now certain that our planet is warming at an unprecedented rate, and human activities that emit carbon, such as driving our cars and heating our homes, are the cause of the change. This is already having a devastating effect on developing countries. As cooler regions warm, disease is spreading. For example, the highlands of Tanzania and Rwanda, previously unaffected by malaria, have seen the rate of infection rise in recent years. Prolonged periods of drought are wrecking harvests lives. Unprecedented ruining temperature rises reduce crop yields and lead to the extinction of plant and animal species, destroying the delicate balance of ecosystems on which people struggling to earn a living depend.

Rapid melting of glaciers is bringing flooding in some areas, and in the long term the disappearance of tropical glaciers threatens dire water shortages for hundreds of millions of people

in South America and Asia. Rising ocean temperatures fuel more intense and destructive extreme weather events, and the expansion of warming oceans, together with melting polar ice and collapsing ice sheets, could raise sea levels by up to six metres. It is estimated that by 2050, 150 million people will be environmental refugees, including around 15 million from Bangladesh.

In any natural or man-made disaster, it is the poor who suffer most, and the ongoing effects of climate change are no exception. Rich countries and rich people can afford to rebuild stronger houses and protect their livelihoods; poor countries simply do not have the means to do this. Even in countries such as El Salvador, people in the capital with access to more resources and education will fare better than the rural poorer communities.

People in rich countries are responsible for emitting around 12 times more carbon into the atmosphere than those in poor countries. This balance needs to be redressed. Those of us in the developed world need to emit less carbon, and pay compensation to developing countries, so that their development may continue in an environmentally friendly way.

Please take action on climate change. Sign the prayer and action card during Christian Aid Week which calls on the Prime Minister to drastically cut carbon emissions.

I enjoy at the end of flicking through the channels on television and Four were Forrest showing The film Gump. had been running for an hour and had reached the part where Forrest starts to run across America from coast

to coast. There is no particular reason for this, but it starts to spark people's imaginations and hundreds of other people start to join him on his journey. The film always strikes a chord because I like running and periodically passers by like to make a comment when passing by. The most popular over a number of years has been a quote from the film: *run*, *Forrest*, *run*.

There are a number of references to running in the stories of Jesus and in particular John's account of the first Easter morning. In John's account of the resurrection, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been rolled away. So she runs away from the burial place and pelts straight into Peter and the unnamed beloved disciple, and tells them that someone has taken Jesus out of the tomb and she and her companions have no idea where he has been taken. Mary runs in panic and grief, but after passing on the news to the two disciples they start running back towards the tomb. John states that this was not a gentle jog, but a race, in which the beloved disciple outruns Peter and reaches the tomb first.

When Peter has caught up, he goes into the tomb and observes the linen wrappings and cloth that had been around Jesus' body. Then the beloved disciple enters and we are told that he saw and believed. He is the first person to believe in the Easter news of resurrection. John shows that the others come to believe in different ways. Mary believes that Jesus is alive when he speaks her name in the garden, the other disciples believe when he appears to them, and Thomas only believes when he can see Jesus and touch him. For the beloved disciple the only evidence he needs is the empty tomb. He peers in the dark, but by doing so his faith is kindled. He did not need any external proofs or physical evidence; he was able to run towards the tomb with a sense of rising expectancy that the world had been changed.

The description of the running disciples gives some sense of the mixture of emotions on that first Easter morning. The image suggests pounding heartbeats, sweat, exhaustion, and breathlessness, also rising anticipation excitement. The world is changing and it is impossible to stand still and the implication given in the Gospels is that you have to keep moving. We may well come to Easter with a sense of faith, doubt or bewilderment, but quite possibly there is something in the story that sparks our curiosity and imagination. encouragement within the Gospel story is not to ignore that feeling, but act upon it and search out where it might lead.


