

### Your Berkhamsted Leader by Fr Michael Bowie



I was captivated by the unfolding rescue of the Chilean miners. At first I thought my interest might be heightened by personal connection.

But the story fascinated people who knew no more about Chile than a good bottle of wine. For me, there was something elementally compelling and moving about the rescue. I think it was partly the human scale of it: 33, the number of those trapped underground, is the number in a school class, a room full of people, a medium-sized meeting, a small church service; it is easy to understand the mixture of claustrophobia and hope and the familial repercussions of their situation. Events on the scale of tsunamis and earthquakes, fires and floods are more difficult to comprehend: we should, for example, continue to be aware of the urgent needs of the poor people of Haiti.

I watched, as I'm sure many of you did, the live coverage on BBC 24, as the men were pulled from the ground and reunited with their families. I couldn't stop watching it, willing them to get all Los 33 above ground. Other things had compelled my attention through the weeks – the immediate impulse to set up shrines, to celebrate Mass, to burn candles and pray for each of the men: the invocation of the local statue of the Virgin Mary - Our Lady of the Candellaria who was asked, together with San Expedito (who is, in Chile, the patron saint of getting things done), to watch over the men. There was also the pride in the rescue-technology, developed by the Chilean navy: 'at last', I

heard one Chilean remark, 'we can be known for something other than Pinochet and earthquakes; we have shown we can pull together and solve a problem ourselves'.

But, for me, the best commentary on this story came from Giles Fraser in the Church Times: he saw this rescue as a perfect metaphor for the core story of Christianity. We usually call it 'salvation' (a churchy word) or 'redemption', from the (now happily quaint) vocabulary of freeing slaves. But the central narrative of Christianity (which has its physical beginning in the birth of Jesus) is, in modern English, 'rescue'. Christianity is not, primarily, about being nice or behaving ethically. Those things we *can* do by an exercise of will. However, as St Augustine understood, we are often so addicted to pleasing ourselves in destructive ways that, too often, we don't make the effort. We get stuck underground, cut off from light and life, on a treadmill of competitiveness and alleged success. The point of Christmas is to remind us that there is a source of light, and rescue, readily available to us, because God came down into the pit and worked with us until, at Easter, he broke out into the full glare of light and offered us the chance to come with him. If we use that truth to guide our lives and our choices, to put successes as well as problems into perspective, to see how we should regard others and their needs as well as our own, the potential of our lives is hugely enhanced. Christmas is our welcome to the light at the end of the tunnel. VB

### Air crash at Ashridge

**Dan Parry** recounts the fate of a group of American airmen whose aircraft crashed in Ashridge sixty seven years ago this month

Just up the A4506, the ghostly remains of ancient fields, farms and forts litter our local countryside. The likes of Gallows Hill, Witchcraft Bottom and Moneybury Hill ooze history from their very pores. Berkhamsted, (the farmstead among the birch trees, or perhaps among the bergs,

i.e. hills, depending on whom you believe), is surrounded by ancient evidence of feasting and famine, of settlements and trackways; and of war.

For ten young Americans, New Year's Eve 1943, began as another day

in action, fighting their war thousands of miles from home. It was to end in a fatal collision in lonely woodland above Aldbury, where memories of their sacrifice still haunt the area. Scars of the crash linger just a wingspan or two from the warming mugs of tea served up by the staff of the National Trust café.

Pilot 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. John Quillman commanded one of the most experienced crews in the 305<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group of the US Eighth Air Force. With 23 missions under their belt, two more would give them a ticket home. It was not an impossible prospect. Their B-17 aircraft had a legendary reputation for its ability to absorb damage. While the RAF's heavy bombers flew at night, the Americans believed that by filling their

aircraft with guns they could fend off German fighters during the day, when they would have a better chance of seeing their target. The formidable B-17 Flying Fortress – star of the film Memphis Belle – carried no less than 13 heavy machineguns, and consequently required many

men to operate them all. Seven of Quillman's 10-man crew were responsible for protecting the heavy aircraft from the dreaded threat of enemy fighters. Even if attacked, all was not lost. Fire, mechanical failure, mid-air collisions and air attack all took their

toll, yet time and again B-17s returned from a raid missing part of the tail or with an engine stalled and feathered. Pilots had kept their plane hanging in the air under the most difficult conditions.

On December 31<sup>st</sup> 1943, the 305<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group took off from Chelveston in Northamptonshire, tasked with destroying an airbase in Bordeaux, home to the longrange enemy aircraft that roamed the Atlantic, harrying Allied shipping. It's believed that while they were over the target area, Quillman's crew were spotted by a force of 18 fighters. When an enemy plane came racing towards the cockpit, head-on and approaching at a closing speed in excess of 400mph, its machine-

guns carved up the cabin, killing the co-

PO Box 903 Berkhamsted Herts HP4 3ZQ pilot, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Ralph Blake, and leaving Quillman with serious stomach injuries.

Losing blood, unable to call on the help of an



experienced co-pilot and having lost some of the power from two of the four engines, Quillman had no choice but to get back to England as soon as possible. The question of whether he could nurse his plane, his crew and himself through the three-hour flight home must have pressed upon him every inch of the way.

Possibly helped at the controls by one of the other crewmen, Quillman fought to control the heavy bomber, his fearful young crewmates thinking of God only knows what. Eventually he crossed the Channel, yet still they were far from safe. With the light worsening, fog settling in and dwindling fuel it would be no small task to return to Northamptonshire. Ouillman decided he wasn't going to get as far as Chelveston and instead tried to come into Cheddington, Buckinghamshire, a notoriously difficult airfield at the best of times. Here was safety at last. But the stricken bomber needed a pilot at his physical best. Unable to control his airspeed Quillman came in too fast and was forced to abandon the attempt.

Going round again, this time Quillman was unable to clear poplars at Wigginton, their branches apparently ripping away

part of the aircraft's body and making the Fortress harder to control than ever. Flying at low level in unfamiliar hilly ground on a foggy evening in the dark depths of December, the

end was inevitable. Screaming in above Aldbury, the aircraft plunged into the woods south of the Ashridge monument. A local nurse scrambled up the hill to help the wounded, and searching beside the burning wreckage she found men with dreadful injuries. The fire was so intense that nearby houses were pelted by machine-gun bullets triggered by the heat. The next morning local boys went up to investigate, among them Peter Barford, still living in Aldbury today. They discovered that one of the crew, possibly the tail gunner, had walked away from the crash with barely a scratch. They also found that three men had been killed – in addition to Blake the co-pilot – and that those who had died had all been in the nose of the plane. Navigator 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt Jean Rapetti and bombardier 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Adolph Erickson both lost their lives – so too did John Quillman. All are now buried in the States, the ruins of their aircraft long since cleared away. Today Ian White, the UK contact for the 305th Bomb Group Memorial Association, says it's time the crash site was marked with a permanent memorial. Until that happens, shattered tree stumps and scarred chestnut trees are all that remain to pay testimony to Ouillman's heroic attempt to reach safety. and to the lives of him and his comrades.



#### Letter to Santa

## **Fiona Powell** learns how we can post letters to Santa and raise money for charity this Christmas

Santa's Elves will be in Berkhamsted again for the town's Festival of Light on the 5th December. Children visiting the Elves Posting House at the Civic

Centre will create and post a letter to Santa; make a Christmas decoration; and receive some magical reindeer food to take home. There will be a drink and cookies, and the Espinosa dancing elves

will deliver the letters direct to Santa when he arrives along the High Street at 5.30pm.

The ticket cost is £4 per child and the event is organised by the Lions of Berkhamsted. All of this money will go to charity, since it is run by volunteers, with additional materials and time kindly donated by Re:create, Berkhamsted Arts and Crafts and the Pottery Project.

'The Posting House was a very popular event last year,' said Head Elf and Lions member, Emma Pearce. 'We recommend you arrive early to avoid disappointment'.

The Posting House doors open at 3.30pm, at the start of the Festival of Light. This year's festival will also include charity stalls, mulled wine, and local bands and

choirs. After the lights have been switched on there will be a Festival of Carols at St Peter's church at 6.00pm.

In 2009/10 the Lions raised over £14,000 from 16 events, including The Elves Posting House. The club is a member of Lions Clubs International, which is one of the largest and most active service organizations in the world. They welcome, by invitation, men and women of any age, and have no affiliations to politics or religion. All the money they raise is donated to charity (expenses are not charged to the charitable trust) and they donate 90% locally and 10%

overseas. Berkhamsted organizations that have benefited from their support include The Hospice of St Francis, Iain Rennie Hospice at Home, Hope for Children, St Johns Ambulance, the ATC, the Swan Project,1st Berkhamsted Scouts and Raiders Football Club. VB

#### A Busy December for St Peter's Choir by Fiona Powell


December is a busy month for St Peter's

## Changing face of Berkhamsted

The **Save Your Berkhamsted** association tells us about an important public consultation, which ends this month

Dacorum Borough Council has just published its Draft Core Strategy and the document is available for your comments until 15th December. The core strategy will form the basis for a new Local Development Framework which will be used to guide development in the borough for the next 20 years.

The document can be found on the Dacorum Borough Council website under the link to Planning and Building Control, then News and Current Issues and finally Consultation on Draft Core Strategy. Alternatively, you can go to the www.saveyourberkhamsted.co.uk website and copy and paste the appropriate link on the homepage into your browser to go straight to the document. Section 22 covers the proposals for Berkhamsted and proposes that there would be development of around 50 homes per year though to 2031.

Over the past year, the Save Your Berkhamsted Residents' Association has been representing the views of local residents to both Berkhamsted Town Council and Dacorum Borough Council and, strengthened by a petition of more than 1500 signatories, has made residents' concerns known via a number of formal meetings with the 2 councils.

We are particularly concerned at the scale of the developments proposed, especially the strategic developments. Any development that would build 200 homes on only 14 hectares would have a major

impact on traffic, availability of schools, doctors, dentists and care for the elderly as well as impacting negatively on the environment and local wildlife, green belt and agricultural land. There are also local issues about adequate water pressure and problems with drainage and sewage treatment.

There is also major concern that these developments would be completely out of character with the surrounding density and style of housing.

We believe that the character of our historic market town needs to be preserved and any housing developments need to fit in with the existing character of the area. There needs to be substantial investment in infrastructure before the developments go ahead.

We believe that we need to preserve areas of trees which support Berkhamsted's notable bat population and other wildlife. Save your Berkhamsted Residents' Association is continuing to represent the view of local residents to Dacorum Borough Council but the publication of the Draft Core Strategy allows everyone to comment.

Now it is the turn of local residents. It is vitally important that as many people as possible respond to the Council's request for comments. Please take the time to make your views known before the document is published and set in stone!

### The Christmas Story by Fr John Pritchard

Professor Hans Kung wrote "Today, for many people all over the world, religion has become not the *opium* of the people but the *liberation* of the people. Western intellectuals are often prejudiced against religion. They think that religion does not matter. All other things matter, but not religion." SGH Lecture 1986

It's a fine line going into schools and teaching the stories of religion and engaging with young and old in the traditions of our culture. This work is particularly encouraged in our church schools. You might be aware of the statistics, 25.3% of all state primary schools in England are Church of England schools - that's 4.470 schools. 5.8% of all state secondary schools in England are Church of England schools - 220 schools. 18.6% of all primary pupils and 5.8% of all secondary pupils attend these schools and these percentages in each case seem to be growing. Yet at this wonderful time of the year, at Christmas, you don't see quite so many people opting into the story, but gradually, more children opting out of the story because of their own defined cultural and religious beliefs. The traditions of our communities are widening as we become more engaged with living in a developing "plural society".

J S Furnivall defined the plural society in the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century as "a medley of peoples – European, Chinese, Indian and native, who do mix but do not combine. Each group holds by its own religion, its own culture and language, its own ideas and ways. As individuals they meet, but

only in the marketplace in buying and selling. There is a plural society, with different sections of the community living side by side, within the same political unit."

I believe that religious discourse, theology and practice contribute to the betterment of our individual lives and community life together, and that is in part the basis of "teaching the faith" to all people. Within our social structure the practice of prayer or silence, the encouragement in faith and careful learning, is meant to lead members of faith communities to an intellectual and emotional understanding of purpose and experience. From that place of learning and practice we try our best to perceive good, act for good and contribute in a way which is beneficial towards all humanity whether on a local or global scale. From a Christian perspective, our faith asks that we are engaged in speaking of "hope" for every human being. It might seem illusive, but the hope of Christianity, is not just for Christianity, but for all humanity. And also for Christianity, a significant beginning of that story is found in the Christmas Story.

The celebration of Christmas is perhaps just one opportunity for many of us to acknowledging the good influence possible in our religious practice and education.

My concern is less about evangelism towards people of other faiths; rather that people now face a genuine option in our society between religion and no religion at all. Does that help us? **y**B
