Forgive me for stating the obvious, but autumn is well underway. The air is cold and often wet, the sky a baleful pallor. The time has come to wrap up warm and hunker



Yet advertising encourages us to indulge in the fantasy of a perpetual summer, a land of endless gambolling beneath sunny skies, in a state of perpetual youth and beauty, vigour, vim, green shoots and get-up-and-go. Winter sun holidays, tanning booths, nightclubs with the heating up so we can dance around in crop tops (I do this all the time, of course) and pretend it's Ibiza - all these things beckon us in from the cold reality outside. And to some extent, that's all well and good. We need such summer fantasies on our grey island. I'd like a bit of winter sun myself. But the cold months are important, too. We can't live a life of nonstop growth and energy. Ours is a world of seasons, and we need to respect the pattern of these seasons as much as everything else on earth does: to take time to hibernate, to refresh, to let the growth come gently underneath the frosty ground. Then, when the warm months come, we will be ready for them

Many churches are guilty of the mentality of the perpetual summer, always brash and cheery, focussing on outwardly obvious growth and energy. And frankly, the forced smiles can grow rather tiresome. After the white of All Saints on the first of November, we come on the second to the pensive black of All Souls, when we pray for and with the dead loved ones, reflecting that we will one day join them. Soon after, we move to the penitential purple of Advent. This 'mini-Lent' is a time for reflection and inner growth, as we seek, warm and nourish the Christ hidden within each of us, ready for His birth, in golden splendour, at Christmas.



Julian Dawson looks at varied and surprising references to our town in the media

Berkofest was a big hit, helped by a glorious brief taste of late summer, and as befitting an event of this local stature there was plenty of coverage on the internet. I particularly enjoyed publicity from the enticingly entitled muddystilettos.co.uk which stated that "Berkhamsted punches above its weight with theatre, festivals and independent loveliness" and I stifled a guffaw when it described the town as "flirtatiously nudging south Bucks". I say, steady on! In a later blog the writer describes the Ashridge estate as heavenly. I'll have a glass of whatever they're having Cricket fans amongst you may have come across a blog by Peter Baxter, former producer of the peerless Test Match Special. In the appropriately named aftertms.blopspot he writes thoughtfully about what makes a good commentator, emphasising that tone is as important as knowledge. Great exponents include John Arlott, John Murray and Clare Balding. He also enjoys the voice of Radio Four's Charlotte Green. He is "sure it is she who informs you - gently and politely - that you are approaching Berkhamsted or Kings Langley and warns you not to leave any of your belongings on board when you get to Euston."

I've mentioned a few local pubs in my column, so to be even handed this month's honorary mention goes to The Old Mill, which is mentioned in Dispatches by the blog foodandcity wordpress, "Nice and quirky with beautiful little garden at the canal it offers really good food the whole day". Interestingly its sister pub is in Harpenden, just across valley and dale from here. And whilst we are talking about local hostelries, the *Berkhamsted and*

Tring Gazette reports on Kings Arms owner Oakman Inns' purchase of the Crown and Thistle in Abingdon for the little matter of 1.6 million. No lack of funds there.

Now you really know you've made it when you make an appearance in the esteemed *Financial Times*, thanks to the British Film Institute archive at our town. In Peter Aspden's film and TV column he discusses that the 3D threshold has been crossed and chats with the BFI about the complexities of the medium. I'm not sure we are yet ready for a 3D version of *YB*, but don't rule anything out.

Intriguingly, Berkhamsted crops up in the East Anglian Daily Times. A proposed Tesco mini store in Aldeburgh, Benjamin Britton land, has attracted objections from such far flung places as our own local town and far flung Strasbourg! This leads a Suffolk mother to react "What do they know about a busy working mum in Aldeburgh who wants to see more choice in her home town to make the family food budget go further?" Which does rather raise the question as to whether we would be happy with Suffolksiders or French residents having a view on our local Marks and Spencer. Which incidentally does seem to be going ahead now extra parking has been allocated.

And finally, Vodafone customers will have been frustrated by the lack of network for the second time this year. Rantings on the Vodafone Forum have been much in evidence. A reminder of life when one relied on the landline, telegraph, and carrier pigeon.

Berkhamsted Tennis Club

In this article, I will be talking about 'Berkhamsted Lawn Tennis & Squash Rackets Club' (BLT&SRC). Many of you will probably think that tennis is a summer sport, however many people, including me, continue to play tennis throughout the year and into the winter months.

I have been playing tennis since a very young age and have been receiving tennis lessons at Berkhamsted Tennis Club. It's a great place to go and play tennis, providing you have a membership or have lessons there. I started off doing the mini tennis levels and went up from red to green. I'm now currently in one of the development squads at the club which I do with a group of people all of a similar age. I am coached every Monday and our lessons usually consist of different types of drills, fun games and matches.

As well as the development squads which I am in there is also the 'Berkhamsted Elite Tennis Academy'. This is for tennis players who want to take their game to the next level; they train more than once a week which means taking part in the programme is a huge commitment. There is a prestige level in which children aged 4

-10 take part, whilst there is also an older group which takes on the challenge of developing teenagers into 'stars of the future'. The

team of coaches involved in the academy is led by Australian Tyrell Diaz Stevens, an ATP World Ranked Player.

The club has great facilities which include 11 outdoor courts, of which 10 are floodlit. The courts are a mix of carpet, synthetic grass, concrete and just recently a new artificial clay surface was installed. Meanwhile there are also two indoor courts.

You can also play squash at the club which you can again receive lessons for. There are six inside courts at the back of the club of which two have glass backs with seating areas. There is plenty to do down at the club: Friday nights see Junior Night where young budding tennis players can go in order to improve their tennis skills and just have a fun time playing tennis related games.

There are also lots of social events at the club within the bar area which has two separate lounges, one of which has a flat screen TV with SKY attached.

If anyone is interested in playing tennis or receiving coaching then BLT&SRC is the place to go and play! **yB**

How the First World War began in Berkhamsted

The Devil's Own was the proud nickname of the Inns of Court

Trays of poppies are here again, and with them – like a familiar though slightly prickly friend – comes again the process of trying to stop the thing falling off your lapel, or turning into mush in the rain or stabbing you in the chest with its pin. But beyond the fancy ones with leaves, and the big ones for your car, what are the poppies all about? Of course, particularly given the war in Afghanistan, we buy them to commemorate those who have lost their lives in the service of their – our - country in conflict, whether recently or in the past. When it comes to remembering conflicts, poppies traditionally conjure up thoughts of the First World War, and from this autumn our WWI heritage is about to be explored in detail amid new archaeological work on Berkhamsted Common

For Field Marshal Lord Kitchener, he of the 'Your Country Needs You' posters, the First World War began on August 3rd 1914, in Berkhamsted. The unbridled carnage unfolded soon after he sat down to tea under the carved stonework of the elegant loggia outside the library at Ashridge. Receiving a telegram, he read the note in silence, put it in his pocket and then announced that he had to leave at once, that he couldn't say why but his hosts would understand tomorrow. The telegram summoned him to London where he was appointed Secretary of State for War, and the next day war with Germany was declared.

Early on, Kitchener saw the need for thousands of additional recruits and gave his face to the famous poster that pulled them in. Many came to Berkhamsted with the Inns of Court Officer Training Corps, who camped on what is now known as Kitchener's Field, behind the castle. Many of the men were billeted throughout the town, including Private Oliver Pearson who, in October 1915, wrote home to his family in Nottinghamshire to say he "was extremely lucky" to be given a bed at 24 Victoria Road "as most were billeted in sheds in a wood-vard". Private Pearson's "co-billeter" was a senior sergeant in a previous regiment, whose "former power has not yet worn off".

Training in the woods of Berkhamsted Common, the men dug 13,000 yards of zig-zag trenches in preparation for duty on the front-line. Brief stretches of these can still be seen in remote corners of the common, tucked away in Frithsden Beeches, at Norcott Hill and elsewhere. In fact, from this autumn, volunteers supporting the Chilterns Commons Project will plot the location of these trenches – and anyone wanting to help should make contact via the details below

In nearly five years from 1914, over 14,000 men passed through the area, most of whom were subsequently sent to the front – where the average life expectancy of an officer in the trenches was between just four and six weeks. While three were awarded the Victoria Cross, 2,147 men gave their lives in France and another 5,000 were injured, fighting for generals whose agility and ingenuity on the battlefield was, at best, mixed. Among the more astute commanders was General Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien who was born and buried in Berkhamsted. Given command of II Corps of the British Expeditionary Force (BEF) by Kitchener, his lifelong friend. Smith-Dorrien frequently clashed with the commander of the BEF. Sir John French, in a prolonged period of tension that unfairly eroded his reputation and ultimately damaged his career.

After the first battle of Mons, (August 23, 1914), Sir John ordered the BEF to abandon its equipment and hastily retreat. Ignoring the order, Smith-Dorrien mounted a spirited defensive action that bought his men enough time to gather up their supplies and make a fighting

withdrawal This decision infuriated French who accused Smith-Dorrien of ieopardising the whole BEF. Four months later Smith-Dorrien took command of the Second Army, but further tension during the second battle of Ypres (April 1915) led French to sack Smith-Dorrien, who played no significant role in the rest of the war. French later wrote a partly inaccurate account of the start of the war, attacking Smith-Dorrien who as a serving officer was denied permission to reply in public. He later served as Governor of Gibraltar, devoted time to the welfare of Great War soldiers and played himself in the film The Battle of Mon, (1926). Smith-Dorrien died in 1930. He is buried in Three Close Lane Cemetery, and while there are memorials to him (in one form or another) in Canada, Gibraltar, and Australia there is little in his home town to remind us of him. Smith-Dorrien's is just one of dozens of local WWI stories that will inevitably emerge as the centenary anniversaries begin in a couple of years' time. For the moment, however, our memories are largely confined to the poppies.

Ex-Jockey leads Remembrance Parade

There are people in Berkhamsted whose face is familiar but you can't remember where you've seen it. One such is Chris Richards. He is the Standard Bearer for the Berkhamsted Royal British Legion and has

led the Remembrance Day procession for the last several years.

As Remembrance Day approaches, I thought it would be interesting to talk to Chris, and find out a bit about the man behind the flag. Apart from a spell in the Army (King's Troop Royal Horse Artillery), I didn't know what to expect.

In fact, there emerges a mixed and fascinating life. Born in Shrewsbury in the middle of the second World War. Chris grew up in the National Children's Home in Manchester. Small and wiry, he had precisely the right physique for a jockey. and was apprenticed in York to a flat racing stable. He rode for some eight or nine years, progressing to "Travelling Head Lad" in the well known stables at Lambourn. Chris explains that the "Travelling Head Lad" was top of the tree and enjoyed the privilege of accompanying the horses and meeting all the owners. So I suppose it was no surprise that, having decided to join the Army, he continued working with horses in the RHA

Chris's Army career was cut short by a broken shoulder, suffered whilst dragracing with Army colleagues, and in a complete career change he moved to Berkhamsted in 1968 as a barman in the Kings Arms. The Kings Arms was quite a different place in those days and Chris remembers three or four coaches each week from London on their way to Stratford, stopping at Berkhamsted to see the castle and have lunch at the pub.

Clearly never one to stand still, Chris became a cocktail barman and, after a period learning about wine in London, moved to become Bar Manager in the Swan Hotel. Anyone watching the film "The Human Factor", based on the Graham Greene novel and shot in Berkhamsted, might spot Chris as one of the extras.

His next and final career move was to set out in his own business selling cuisine items door to door. This was not an easy life and Chris remembers many 14 hour days to make ends meet.

A major part of Chris's life since he came to Berkhamsted has been the Royal British Legion, both the organisation and the club (just off the High street). He has been a member for 44 years, and is very proud of the RBL's 90 year old tradition.

I asked Chris how he would compare modern Berkhamsted with the town in 1968. His reply was interesting because I confess to thinking that he would be remembering the "good old days". Far from it. "You couldn't even buy a cheese sandwich after two o'clock then" he recalls, and contrasts the modern thriving mixed High street with the many boarded up shop windows in 1968. He remembers that, at that time, Berkhamsted was home to six or seven major Head Offices:

Outspan, Pepsi-Cola and The Wellcome Foundation amongst them. All now long gone. I could only find a couple of pet hates: please don't call it Berko he begs, and please wait for the Green Man before crossing the road!

All in all, Chris Richards is a great fan of Berkhamsted, its people and its ambience.

The Graham Greene Festival, Berkhamsted, 2012

The Graham Greene Festival has just finished in Berkhamsted This was the Fifteenth Festival. Fifteen years ago people in Berkhamsted were saving 'Is it possible to find enough to fill up four days with material on Greene?' or 'Graham was not the sort of person who would have approved of gatherings in his name'. Neither response has proved correct; and nothing could have been more heart-warming than the initial gathering, here in the town, of friends from all over the world - friends who come loyally year by year, and who enjoy a common focus and Berkhamsted in the early autumn. They are joined by members of the Greene family. Festival events are held in the Town Hall. the Civic Centre, the Rex and at the School, Graham, as probably most people in the town know, was the son of the Headmaster of the School, and he was born in St John's in 1904. He maintained that what happened in his childhood here was the key to his life and writing. This is a real Berkhamsted occasion. This year the main film was 'The Human Factor', which starred John Gielgud, Derek Jacobi, Nicol Williamson and Richard Attenborough. Filmed in 1979, it used Berkhamsted settings including the station, Castle Hill, the High Street and Birtchnell's shop - now, regrettably, no more.

The Festival is a happy blend of films, talks, meals together and good cheer. This year it began with a literary Quiz in aid of the Hospice; and there is, each year, a creative writing course. Greene papers, letters and diaries are, in the main, housed

in three libraries in America, and those resources attract international research Much is still being discovered of Graham's life which was complex and rich in its interests, travelling, and loyalties, as well as in the writing. This year we found Graham in Vietnam, Tallin, Vienna, Cuba. The Festival this year was directed by Professor Neil Sinvard who has been entertaining us from as far back as 1998 with his wit and cinematographic wisdom. This year he brought matters to a memorable conclusion with his examination of the famous legal case of 1937. Graham, in his magazine 'Night and Day' had written of the sexual precocity of the nine-year-old Shirley Temple. Greene's observations seemed to us, as we watched Miss Temple's performances, not at all unreasonable, but the case was settled in the actress's favour and the libel was adjudged 'a gross outrage'. Poor Greene had to pay up. For four days Berkhamsted becomes the centre of the world for those who are interested in Graham Greene. Those reading this article should realise that from 26th September 2013 – that is next year – they will find congenial company mingling at the Festival, and celebrating a man who was born in the town, who was both happy and unhappy at school here, and who wrote: 'I feel it would be strange if, through the workings of coincidence....I were not brought back to die there (Berkhamsted) in the place where everything was born.' He is, though, buried in Vevey, in Switzerland.

Sea bass with fennel, orange dressing and basil pesto

Fennel can be a polarising ingredient – people either seem to love or hate its mild aniseed flavour - but it is really delicious in this dish and you may even be able to convert some sceptics. Fennel is an important ingredient in Mediterranean cooking and it grows all around the region. An interesting point of trivia is that the Greek name for fennel is *marathos* and the place of the famous battle of Marathon and the subsequent sports event Marathon, literally means a field with fennels. To make this a more filling meal, you could serve this with potatoes. If sea bass is not available or is too expensive, you could use any other white fish in its place.

Ingredients

4 sea bass fillets

2 large bulbs of fennel

4 tbsp olive oil

1 tsp salt

1 tsp caster sugar

200ml freshly squeezed orange juice

Pesto ingredients

25g packet of fresh basil

1 clove of garlic

50g parmesan cheese, freshly grated

25g pine kernels

3 tablespoons olive oil

1. Make the basil pesto by putting all ingredients in a food processor and whizzing until fairly smooth. You do not want it to be too dry, so if it is a bit stiff, add a little more oil and perhaps some lemon juice or white wine vinegar as well. 2. Preheat the oven to 190C. Prepare the fennel by trimming the tops and then slicing each bulb in half length ways. Cut out the hard core of the fennel but leave the bottom end intact so that the bulb doesn't fall apart. 3 Heat 2 tbsp of oil in a large frying pan (or a flameproof oven pan if you have



fennel and put the fennel halves into the pan. Cook until slightly browned on both sides. Add the orange juice and cook over a high heat for a few minutes to reduce. Spoon the juice over the fennel as it cooks. 4. Transfer the fennel and juices to an oven dish and cook in the oven for 15-20 minutes. Baste the fennel twice during this

time with the juice.

5. When the fennel is nearly ready, heat the remaining 2 tbsp of oil in a large frying pan and fry the fish skin side down on a moderately high heat for about 3 minutes. Flip the fish and cook for about 1 minute on the other side. You may need to adjust these cooking times based on the thickness of your fish, but to keep it as moist as possible, try to do most of the cooking on the skin side and do not over cook it. 6. To serve, place the fennel on the plate, then balance the fish fillet on top and spoon

over the juices from the fennel oven dish.

Dress with the basil pesto and serve.
