
no doubt all before lunch!





How do you mark the passing of a giant?

As most of you will know by now the most notable tree in Frithsden Beeches died, as it had lived, in a most spectacular way. We had been told there was a problem and when we investigated, half of the tree had split away and fallen to the ground. Whilst we pondered what to do, the other larger half decided it couldn't stand without its counter-weight and crashed to the ground.

Many of you may be thinking well that's

Many of you may be thinking well that's that then another old tree bitten the dust – but as the great storms of the 1980s and 90s showed us, there is life after death. The amount of 'timber' that has now been made available to those myriad of deadwood munching insects and fungi is quite staggering and the vast space left in the canopy will allow light to flood down to the forest floor, which has been starved of light by such a dominant beech tree, and allow all sorts of dormant plant life to flourish.

There will be a rush to be first to fill the space and for a while provide it will be a natural area that will stimulate peoples imagination for years to come.

If we could transport ourselves forward, say 50 years, there will be a thicket of trees in a roughly circular shape and a few lumps of moss covered rotting logs. Hopefully it will be alive with lots of buzzing insects and chirping birds, this new vibrant woodland will be a good way to mark the passing of a fallen giant.

A tribute to Nancy Lawrenson

In 2012 a lady called Nancy Lawrenson began writing a series of articles for YB entitled "A Century In and Out of Berkhamsted". Nancy had lived in the town since 1956 but her account began in 1912 with the marriage of her parents, several years before her birth in 1915. Her detailed and varied account of her personal experiences over the last century

gave us a unique insight into her life and her fond memories of Berkhamsted. David Hilling, a close friend of Nancy, now shares his own memories of her after she sadly passed away recently. Helen Dowley

Nancy Lawrenson came to live in Berkhamsted in 1956 when her husband Jim was appointed chaplain at Berkhamsted Boys School.

Nancy taught at Berkhamsted Girls School and at the Tring Park Performing Arts School and with active membership of St Peter's Church it is hardly surprising that she came to know, and was well known by, a very large number of local people who will have been saddened by news of her recent death. Nancy was a very determined lady and it was typical of her that she died in the family home and this she did peacefully just a year short of her 100th birthday.



Nancy packed a great deal into that near century. While doing a degree in French, History (a life-long interest) and Economics at Bedford College. London, Nancy became involved in the League Against War and Fascism, help for the Spanish Democratic Republic and the Women's' University Settlement in Southwark for whom she assisted at a young boys' evening club and a mothers and babies clinic. She became an LCC Schools Child Care Worker and was heavily involved in the war-time evacuation of Lambeth children to Cornwall - a place and life so different from home that there were problems for Nancy to deal with - her highly developed social conscience was never to leave her.

In 1936 she visited Nazi Germany, travelled widely on the cheap and learnt German. The following year she did an exchange with a friend at Geneva University and spent much time at the debates of the League of Nations. She enjoyed travel and developed a particular love of Greece, which became a feature of family holidays and a frequent source of reminiscence.

On holiday in Cornwall in 1942, Nancy met Jim Lawrenson, a Church of England priest and they were married a year later. His approach to Nancy's mother for her daughter's hand brought the response that "Nancy is very independent – she doesn't need anyone's permission" – a Nancy some of us have known! For Nancy Jim's life as chaplain at a Young Offenders Prison, padre at a Probation Officer Trajaing College and then chaplain at Berkhamsted School was preferable to to being a vicar's wife!

Nancy enjoyed company and conversation and as near neighbours we were frequently invited in for a "cuppa", we were receivers of apples and exchangers of plant cuttings and possibly because we came to Berkhamsted from West Africa conformed to her vision of the town as a base for many with overseas experience. We often wondered at the number of such people she knew and assumed we did too! David Hilling



Berkhamsted played an important role in World War I. Troops dug over seven miles of trenches on the common and a military hospital was set up in Ashridge House.

Today, the former training ground near the Castle (now the cricket club) bears the name "Kitchener's Field", after Lord Kitchener, Secretary of State for War whose image featured on those famous recruitment posters.

100 Years – WW1 Tales of two photos

Remembrance Sunday will bring back many memories for Sunnysiders, and two particularly poignant ones have recently come to my attention. The first concerns World War I and the second, World War II.

I should like to thank Mary Batchelor for telling me this story about her grandfather.

The second little girl from the right of this photograph, taken by Sills of Berkhamsted, is Olive Batchelor, still remembered at Sunnyside. She lived in Ellesmere Road all her life and loved to talk about Sunnyside's past.



Her father, Gazely Grace, was a staunch member of the congregation. He and his brother sang in the choir. When war broke out he joined up, and later this photo of his young family was taken at Sills, the Berkhamsted photographer, and his family sent it out to him. Just a few days before the Armistice, in October 1918 he was killed in action. The family were not informed until December. He is buried in the Highland Cemetery in France.

Eventually, in 1925 this photograph came to light. The only clue to its possible owner was the name of Sills printed on it. It was sent back to the Berkhamsted shop, where immediately someone recognised the Grace family and it was returned to them The photo at least came home, and remains a treasured possession.

Thanks too for the second story told by June Bendall, the step-daughter of the Rev. Thomas Hawes who was vicar of Sunnyside throughout the Second World War.

The two Frost brothers, whose grave you can see just outside the porch, were killed within days of each other in June 1940.

Not long afterwards a fighter plane crashed into the railway embankment just west of the church and the unknown young pilot was killed. Accounts differ as to his nationality, although at the time it was generally held that he was German.

Whoever he was, he was certainly far from home, but since it all happened within the Sunnyside parish a funeral was to be conducted here at St Michael's. Mrs Hawes, as vicar's wife, felt she must attend it on some other distant parent's behalf, thinking that there would certainly be nobody else to mourn the poor young foreign airman. But she was not quite alone, the twice bereaved Mrs Frost was also in the church. In her generosity, she understood.

(However it is known that an American pilot stationed at Bovingdon came down in the same area in 1943, and the story may refer to him. If you can shed any light on this episode, I should love to hear from you.)

Parish News

On 28th July we mark the outbreak of the First World War one hundred years ago in 1914, surely one of the darkest days in our history. The start of WW1 is a particularly important anniversary this July, but it is not the only one of course. The very same day, for example, is also the anniversary of the execution of Thomas Cromwell in 1540, although that probably won't make a headline.

It is not difficult to find anniversaries for every day of the year but another date you might have overlooked this month is Silence Day on July 10th, kept by the followers of Meher Baba. Meher Baba was an Indian spiritual master who between 10th July 1925 and his death on 31st January 1969 maintained complete silence, communicating only using alphabet boards and hand gestures. He did this, he said, because of humanity's inability to hear and live according to God's words. He once said "Because of humanity's inability to live God's words, man has waged wars in his name. Instead of living the humility, purity, and truth of his words, humanity has given way to hatred, greed, and violence." I think he had a point. Meher Baba's philosophy was decidedly not Christian but perhaps many things he said and did would chime with Christianity, not least with Silent Religious Orders perhaps. Meher Baba also carried out significant charitable work, especially with lepers, the poor and the mentally ill.

How many words do we speak every day? Estimates seem to range from 5.000 to 20.000. I am sure we can all think of someone we wish would say less, and I imagine many of us would like to say more if only others would let us. We are accustomed to sound and words all around us; some people find silence distinctly uncomfortable. Sometimes when I pause for a short period of silence during a church service I am taking, for personal prayer or simply to reflect on a bible reading, I sometimes sense the congregation thinks something has gone wrong or I have forgotten something. But we need times of silence in which to collect our thoughts and reflect on ourselves, times when we will not be distracted and which we can end when we want and not when something uninvited interrupts our peace. A period of silence is time set aside to think, and most of us could benefit from a little more of that. I hope - I recommend that we all take a few minutes of silence. to reflect on the evils of the First World War on July 28th, and again maybe on 4th August when the United Kingdom formally entered the war in 1914, and at the same time to offer prayer for all those who died then and since in other wars, and to give thanks for all the blessings we enjoy.

Your Choir

Dacorum Community Choir at Festival

On the Saturday afternoon of the Wimbledon Ladies' Final, the World Cup quarter finals and the start of the Tour de France in Yorkshire, it was perhaps not surprising that only a small audience heard Dacorum Community Choir and groups from mid-Herts and Watford perform in a local choral festival that showed the current popularity of singing with choirs large and small, youth and adult.

Though dwarfed by the spacious Edward Guinness Hall at Dame Alice Owen's School in Potters Bar, the 40 or so listeners were nevertheless equally appreciative. As is often the case at such events they joined enthusiastically in the final song, I'd Like to Teach the World (to Sing in Perfect Harmony), guided by Peter Twitchin, director of the Mid-Herts Youth and Chamber Choirs, who demonstrated pitch energetically by hopping from note to note.

This followed the majestic and moving Al Shlosha, in Hebrew, extolling the importance of Truth, Justice and Peace, which the community choir learnt specially for this performance.



Your Recipe

Piri Piri Chicken



WITH SWEET POTATO WEDGES TOPPED WITH A SPICY SALSA Serves 2 Ready in 30 mins Kcal 578 fat 36g carb 28g pro 36g (per serving)

Ingredients

Chicken breastsSweet potatoes

1 Punnet of cherry tomatoes

Red Chilli
 Spring onions

1 Red onion

40 ml Oil

20 ml White wine vinegar

1 Piri marinade20g Caster sugar

Here's what to do ...

Firstly, marinate the chicken breasts by coating them in a piri piri marinade (available from most supermarkets). If possible, do this in advance and refrigerate for up to 12 hours before cooking. Pre-heat the oven to 180cc

In the oven, heat a small amount of vegetable oil in an oven-proof tray. Slice the sweet potatoes length-ways into evenly sixed wedges. Each half of a medium sized potato should equate to 4 even sized wedges

Meanwhile, heat some more oil in a frying pan and brown off the premarinated chicken.

Start by frying the chicken skin-side down for approximately3 minutes, before turning over and browning for the other side for a further 3 minutes.

Place both the chicken and the sweet potato wedges on the tray with the heated oil and return to the oven to cook for 15-20 minutes, until soft when pricked with a knife.

Finely dice the red onion, spring onions and chilli and quarter the cherry tomatoes. Mix these ingredients together and stir in the sugar, white wine vinegar and 40 ml of oil to form a salsa.

Once the potato wedges and chicken are cooked (the juices of the chicken should run clear and there should be no pink flesh when cut), you are ready to serve We suggest stacking the wedges on the plate, slicing the chicken in half, placing it on top of the wedges and covering in the salsa. Enjoy

Chef's tips: When marinating chicken, the

longer you can leave it, the greater the chance the flavours will have of infiltrating the meat. NB we would not recommend leaving meat for any longer than 12 hours

Your Garden

Adventures in Boots by Helen Reeley



One thing I'll be remembering for sure this autumn is to sow some hardy annuals for earlier flowering next spring and summer. Around the months of October and November I'm normally too busy to sow seeds as I'm concentrating on finishing up my gardens and thinking about my winter travels. This year I sowed seeds in springtime which are in flower now but my contemporaries who sowed sweet peas last autumn have had flowers for weeks and weeks. But oh! what a beauty my pea is, it's a soft white with a very faint vein of lilac around its petal edge. You may not see the vein here in the photo nor will you smell the perfume but I can assure it is the loveliest of things in the gardens right now. Later today I'll cut all the flowers for posy vases, in a few days there will be more stems to cut.

Another flower which I'll sow this autumn for earlier flowering next year is Calendula. I just cannot get enough of those beautiful orange flowers cut and arranged in a jar with Alchemilla mollis also in flower at the moment. The gayness of the lime green and bright orange is so lifting.

Watering any new plants is a bit onerous during the summer months. If you prepared your soil properly earlier in the season your work will be less. I mulched a huge perennial flower and shrub bed with mushroom compost in March and goodness that stitch in time saved nine. I've scraped away the mulch to dig new holes for new planting; underneath the compost the soil is crumbly with worms, perfect for new plants.

On Saturday 27th September 10am I'll be running another Gardening School class up at Frithsden Vineyard this time looking at winter bulb planting. The class attracts a few regulars now; do call if you'd like to join us. We are the friendliest Garden School on the planet!
