Berkhamsted Review - What's the hurry?

Anyone who lives in or visits
Berkhamsted knows what a nuisance it is
to cross the road at the corner of Lower
Kings Road and the High Street. It seems
that no matter when you arrive at the
crossing, it is always just as the lights turn
red for pedestrians. Then there is the
lengthy wait while traffic streams past
from four different directions.

For lots of people, though, that delay in their busy schedule is just too much to accept. So, with a quick glance around for oncoming vehicles, they take their chances and dash across this busy crossroads. You could argue that it's their life, and if they want to take unnecessary risks with it, then that's their affair. But what about the many impatient folk who are dragging small children across the road with them or, even worse, pushing buggies and prams in front of them?

What makes an adult choose to take that risk with the life of a child whose welfare they are responsible for? And what lesson about road safety is this teaching our children? Is getting to the other side of the High Street in the shortest time possible really so important? There are, of course, plenty of grown-ups with young charges who will patiently wait for the lights to turn green, even if

the roads look clear. By standing with these adults and children until the lights change, we can help educate impressionable young minds on the safest way to cross the road. It might just save a life.


Obviously, it isn't only pedestrians who put lives in danger on the roads. Sadly, drivers texting and making mobile phone calls are common sights in our town.

Recently I saw a woman driving along the High Street, playing with her iPod, with no hands on the steering wheel and no eyes on the road ahead. There were two schoolchildren in the back of the car.

According to the AA, 17 people died last year in traffic accidents in which mobile phone use was the direct cause.

Speeding is another issue in
Berkhamsted, particularly on long
stretches of road such as Castle Street.
Often cars whizz down these streets so
fast it would be impossible for them to
brake in time, should a pedestrian
suddenly appear in front of them.
The Royal Society for the Prevention of
Accidents says that every year around
400 people are killed in crashes caused by
someone exceeding the speed limit or



Your Walk

Great Missenden Stile-Free Walk

This walk starts in the picturesque village of Great Missenden, home of the Roald Dahl Museum. It passes through mature woodlands typical of the Chilterns. The route is undulating and offers some fine views across the Misbourne Valley.

Distance: 2.5 miles (1.5 hours)

Start: Great Missenden Station (Chiltern Line trains from London Marylebone)
SP893013. There is a convenient car park (free on Sundays) in Links Road. There is also parking at the station. There is a direct bus service between Great Missenden and High Wycombe except Sundays.

Access Information: Some sections of the walk can be very muddy after rain (from 3-4 and 5-6). There are a few steep sections on this walk.


Refreshments: There are a number of pubs and a cafe in Great Missenden.

From the railway station follow the road across the railway bridge and turn left down the Private Road. Walk straight along this road which narrows into a stony path. Walk right to the end of the houses ignoring two public footpaths leading off to your right. Turn right up the lane past the garden centre to the left and Gypsy House, the Dahl family home, on the right. Follow the lane to Angling Spring Farm.

At Angling Spring Farm follow the lane (a bridleway) to the left , it narrows between ancient hedges, the end of clean boots in wet weather! Follow the bridleway as it descends through mature woodland, ignoring footpaths on the right. The bridleway turns sharp left at the bottom of the wood, where it widens (this can become a slough of mud in wet weather). The path bends right and dimbs between wood banks and opens out at the end.

When you reach a smart drive on your left lined with young cherry trees, turn left following the footpath along it. Fine views appear across the valley showing Missenden church set in a cluster of trees. Pass the house on the right at the end of the drive, then turn right following the wooden fence. When you reach a car park , turn sharp left following the footpath through a gap in the fence and down the slope. Go through the gate and down the steep slope beside a fine laid hedge. The upward slope gets muddy after rain. At the top you arrive in the middle of large horse paddocks with fine views of the Misbourne Valley.

Follow the footpath to a wooden gate on the right and over the railway bridge . Cross over the railway, then turn right through a kissing gate; the path opens out into an estate adjacent to the Misbourne School. Take the first road on the left, then turn right towards Great Missenden High Street and turn left along it.

Parish News



Good morning from
Wathgill
Camp in
North York-shire! As I
write, we
are waiting
for the Army
cadets to
arrive from
Bedfordshire

and Hertfordshire on their buses, and I am wondering exactly what it will mean to be a chaplain among them.

To be a priest is to be a Christian in a particularly public way - there's no disguising your faith, whether you're wearing a dog collar or a combat uniform with big black crosses on the lapels. Chaplaincy is very much about being a public Christian not only with fellow Christians, but among those who are indifferent or even hostile to the faith. But whether our faith is made obvious in the way one dresses or not, whether we wear our faith on a cross round our neck or on our sleeve or inwardly on our hearts, it should be visible in the way we live.

This theme touches on the great feast that the Church celebrated on 6 August: the Transfiguration. Jesus climbs the mountain as Moses did, but while Moses had to hide his face from God, Jesus looks at His Father face-to-face.

The disciples who go up the mountain with Him see Him blaze with the glory of God for an instant; then the glory fades, and it is the same old Jesus they knew who stands before them. But they have seen Him in a different light, and will never see Him quite the same again. Likewise, with the eyes of faith we grow to see bread and wine as Christ's body and blood: to see Christ in all people, but especially in the needy and distressed: to see the light of the Kingdom just below the veil of all creation, occasionally piercing through. And like Jesus looking at the Father, the more we look and our eyes acclimatise to the glare, the more we too will reflect that light, so that others can see it in us. Perhaps that can tell me something about what it is to be a chaplain and all of us what it is to be a Christian in a world too often shrouded in darkness, as the news keeps reminding us every dav.



The Northchurch Society was formed in 1969 to promote interest in and preservation of local arts and







Fairtrade

More than fair

Like several thousand other idiots around the country who fill a spare bedroom with an unlikely collection of toys, cards, clothes, and comestibles I wonder from time to time why on earth Traidcraft volunteers do it.

Well, we support the principles of Fair-trade but know Traidcraft goes beyond 'fair'. Possibly a unique structure, Traidcraft is a trading company and a development charity working together with a mission is to fight poverty through trade. It is a Christian organisation established in 1979 and works with people of all faiths and none.

Advisers such as agronomists and marketing specialists give training and long term support to small farmers and artisans in poor, remote communities in more than thirty developing countries, working with 100+ producer groups. With help to improve the quality and quantity of their produce, many of these groups eventually achieve Fairtrade status: rice and cotton are two notable Traidcraft successes. Finding international agreement for the Fairtrade Mark for the excellent craft items however is an ongoing challenge. Not all produce is for export, some is sold locally or nationally.

With the widest range of Fairtrade products in the UK and a turnover approaching £30 million, this is a responsible company worthy of your support. Traidcraft goods may be bought or ordered from many local churches, just ask. Sunnyside and St Peter's churches sell on the first Sunday of each month and All Saints on the 2nd Sunday. Crafts, cards and food are also available on each 1st Saturday from 9 – 4 at the Market in the Town Hall, or from Angela - but please phone her first.

Children's Society

Kilimanjaro and a great future for the Children's Society It seems a long time since the Berkhamsted Walk last May, but now the sponsorship deadline is passed we have awarded the prizes donated by The Complete Outdoors. Although there were more walkers again this year, their promises seemed to indicate our receipts might be about £1,000 less than usual. However, we did not account for the massive £1,270 raised by a group of five young ladies from London! This has lifted the income to £6,332, on top of which we can claim Gift Aid from many of the donations.

This group of five has won the prize for the small group raising the highest figure, while Peter Young of Watford, who has raised hundreds of pounds over many years, topped the list and received the £100 voucher for the individual sponsorship.

The compliments we receive on the beauty of the bluebells, the careful waymarking of the route, the general organisation and the delicious cake offered at the end of the walk all encourage us to go ahead with plans for next year. So put Sunday 10th May in your forward planners now. Don't miss the best sponsored walk of the year, with different routes each time to add to its interest.

In the town one day several members of the fund raising committee met a student wearing a Children's Society T-shirt, collecting donations towards £3,000 sponsorship she needed to join a charity trek up Mt. Kilimanjaro. Thirty two Bath University students joined this trek for The Children's Society and between them they raised £80,000. To help Jess Phillips reach her target, the committee offered her the opportunity to give a presentation at the Court House, inviting supporters to join us for wine and a buffet.

None of us had realised what a traumatic experience it is to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro! This six day trek was dramatically recorded by photo and video, showing the effects of the different climate zones they climbed through to the arctic cold and lack of oxygen on the nine hour final stretch to the top.

This final stage started at midnight in order to watch the sunrise over the horizon from this great height. On average, only 44% of trekkers overcome the altitude sickness and reach the summit but all 32 of Jess's group succeeded!

Matthew Reed, the Chief Executive of The Children's Society, also addressed the gathering of 60 supporters. He was brought up in a family which has always supported The Children's Society, and is a fireball of enthusiasm and ambition for the future of the charity! Having been in place for 2 years now, he gave an overview of his plans to make The Children's Society a much more significant and well organised force in the future.

Being a smaller charity than many others it uses its influence with research and campaigning to change public and government attitudes to the needs of children of this country. By stepping up this work it will increase the number of children whose lives are improved by the charity from 40,000 to over a million per year.

Matthew Reed, an ordained priest, has known the desperation of families in areas where large companies close and unemployment rockets. He worked in a Young Offenders prison during his training and has seen the result of children being brought up in the Care System. This costs the taxpayer £200,000 per year per child, and yet, two years after leaving the system, 25% will be involved in the criminal justice system and spiral downwards to a life of crime and prison.

Your Garden

Adventures in Boots by Helen Reeley



When you read this in September things might be a little 'over' in the flower gardens but as I write in August things are blazing away. Crocosmia, Echinacea, Perovskia and Rudbeckia are all putting on their best show in my gardens.

September is truly one of the busiest years in the gardening calendar; for me it marks the start of the horticultural year. All activities from September onwards are geared for what's going to happen next year. Flowering perennials will be cut back to flower again next year and September is the start of the bulb season so I'll select and plant the best varieties for a show next year. I buy bulbs early so I get what I want size and colour wise, most of my planting schemes don't require tall narcissus and tulips for example. And we start planting shrubs and trees again now the heat of high summer is over and dormancy just round the corner. We'll still need to water freshly planted borders for a while especially if autumn proves dry.

This September I shall be propagating semi-ripe cuttings from a few plants. On my list is a particular Penstemon called 'Raven' that has a dark moody purple flower along with Salvia 'Hot Lips' which I simply adore for its pure gayness. Added to the list will be and a few Asters, Pelargoniums and Fuchsias and that will fill up the greenhouse.

Nurseries and garden centres often have plant sales this time of year so look out for bargains that aren't too ragged. If you know what you're doing even a pot bound specimen can be revived with re-potting, dividing, new compost and good soak.

Arabella and me were the guests of the Head Gardener Kevin Martin at Glyndebourne Opera House in August. A group of garden writers were given a guided tour by Kevin before we watched 'Rinaldo' inside and subsequently picnicked outdoors in the beautiful grounds. It's a popular myth that Glyndebourne is an outside opera experience, it is not; the opera house is a modern well designed indoor building with decent seating. But the gardens are more beautiful...

The Tour of Britain comes to Berkhamsted

This month sees the **Tour of Britain** begin on Sunday 7th September with Stage One in Liverpool and then finishing with stage Eight b on Sunday 14th in London. However, on Friday 12th September the Tour is set to come through Berkhamsted and the surrounding areas on the second largest stage of the tour. It starts at Bath, and finishes in Hemel Hempstead, which accumulates to 205.7km of open road cycling.

The Tour is set to feature some of the world's finest riders including 4 times Olympic Gold medallist and 2012 Tour of France winner Bradley Wiggins who will look to defend the title he won in 2013. Ten of the teams competing at the Tour de France will be in action as the cyclists head through Bucks and Herts in the closing stages of stage six.

The Tour is the biggest professional bike race in England and for the first time will pass through Dacorum so those who venture down into the town on the 12th will get to witness a little piece of history.

Stage Six goes through a host of towns, and after passing through Princes Risborough, it heads through Great Missenden and then into Chesham before passing Ashley Green. The cyclists will then proceed towards Chesham Road before going over the A41 and taking a left down Kingshill Way.

Next the route heads down Kings Road and past Butts Meadow before reaching Lower Kings Road, going under the railway and then passing the castle. Upon reaching the castle a right will be taken and Berkhamsted CC and the Kitcheners fields will be on the cyclists left before reaching a steep climb up New Road towards Berkhamsted Golf Club. They'll then go through the common towards Potten End and then eventually into Hemel where the stage finishes at Gadebridge Park.

It'll be a fantastic chance to see some of the World's top riders go through our historic market town and if you get the chance you can also head up to London over the weekend to see the final stages and the conclusion to the 2014 Friends Life Tour of Britain.

The lives of children whose families struggle with low wages and debt can be blighted by deprivation in many ways. With many other illustrations, the audience was enthused by the possibilities for the charity in the future, and inspired to work even harder to support it financially.

The Children's Society began as a charity within the Church of England and its connections continue. Matthew serves on three panels, with the Archbishop of Canterbury, with the Archbishop of York and on an advisory panel with the Lords Bishops who sit in the House of Lords. Every eight weeks he meets Chief Executives of other children's charities working in this country to coordinate ideas, work and publicity. It was good to hear there is co-operation of this nature rather than competition between charities doing similar work.

Everyone was impressed by Matthew's knowledge, enthusiasm and huge desire to make an impact on the deprivation he has seen in his work. The impact on those who heard him resulted in a great desire to do more for The Children's Society.
