



#### Your Garden

Adventures in Boots from Helen Reeley

Envelopes are a feature of my working day during October and November. This year I bought a variety of flower seeds from seed merchant Ben Higgledy in Cornwall which cost a few quid so I'm protecting my investment with some careful seed collecting and some envelopes; decent envelopes with no sneaky gaps. It's a satisfying activity knowing I've got seed stock for myself and some to share with others.

Two of my favourite annuals this year have been Calendula 'Indian Prince' a fabulous hardy annual with bright orange flowers superb for cutting and Ipomoea 'Heavenly Blue' more commonly known as the Morning Glory climbing plant. Both have produced fabulous blooms all season, in fact 'Indian Prince' are still producing small flower heads. Good value these two.

I have a Yew hedge planting project to undertake soon. The soil will be prepared beforehand with well rotted farmyard manure and then we'll excavate one long trench and plant the small 60cm shrubs about three per metre. We expect the hedge to fill out quickly as it's in full sun but we'll need to keep a watchful eye on watering next spring if it's dry. The hedge will line the front of a fabulous period building and will look well groovy with lights draped across the front for events and advent.

Garden exploration once again becomes a (quieter) delight as visitor numbers diminish and light levels drop making photography easier for me.



I ventured out to Gloucestershire the other week and persuaded my friend to nip up to the Rococo Gardens at Painswick. As it wasn't muddy she kindly agreed and we had a very satisfactory couple of hours meandering around the grounds and amusing the inner child in ourselves getting lost in the maze. Titter we did. http://www.rococogarden.org.uk.

I leave Tulip bulb planting until November when the soil is cooler and the risk of the fungal disease Tulip fire is reduced. If you had Tulip plants this year with distorted and twisted stems with brown spots on the leaves, I should dig them up and chuck them out and don't plants Tulips in the same spot for at least three years.

#### Oktoberfest Review

St Peter's Berkhamsted hosted a German cultural weekend to mark both the First World War Centenary and the 25th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall. The first St Peter's kulturelles Oktoberfest was held on 4th and 5th October.

The emphasis on Saturday evening was cultural with a talk by Dr Alix Green from the University of Hertfordshire on how German history is remembered and represented in the present day. The talk was followed by a Song Recital given by the superb London-based music charity 'Song in the City', and was entitled On the Western Front: 's ist Krieg! 's ist Krieg! Singers Adam Sullivan (tenor) Joseph Padfield (baritone) were accompanied by Gavin Roberts (piano). The songs were interspersed with the letters home from the front (on both sides) being read out by young members of the community: Jake Groet, Joe and David Grego; these young men are about the age of the teenage soldiers called up in 1914. Members of the audience were treated to a moving performance of the highest quality from this group of young professional soloists.

The talk was followed by German wine tasting with Swabian Maultaschen (similar to ravioli). The wine was supplied by drinks wholesaler and wine merchant Reiner Ackermann, a friend of organiser Uli Grego, who also travelled from Stuttgart for the event, and who runs such festivals in Germany for a living. The wine tasting was guided by well-known local expert and WSET tutor Mike Eggleton who is both very knowledgeable and entertaining. Most tastees left the evening having ditched their views on German wine as being sweet, insipid and like Liebfraumilch, and instead walked away with a new appreciation for the quality of German wine - particularly the reds.

On Sunday, the German cultural celebration continued. Music at our morning Eucharist borrowed from the powerful and rich Lutheran tradition: harvest was celebrated using good (well-known) German hymn tunes, with full preludes, and featured a performance, from the balcony at the back of the church, of a Buxtehude cantata by members and friends of St Peter's church choir and Bridgewater Sinfonietta. The normal organ voluntary was replaced with a Handel organ concerto.

Our Sunday morning celebration was continued with the key elements of any Oktoberfest - beer and sausage! Members of the congregation and guests from the town (and Germany!) were treated to a traditional Bavarian breakfast with Weiswurst (white sausage) and, of course, wheat beer, Oktoberfestbier and beer from our fantastic local Haresfoot Brewery. It was all accompanied by atmospheric 'oompah' music. The number of smiles were very evident, and

at peak time we had attracted over 100 people sitting at trestle tables or leaning against communal beer tables.

We were particularly favoured by the good weather on Sunday in contrast to the previous day. This along with a great team of helpers helped to make the weekend a great success. It was such a joy to see so many people from inside and outside the church community enjoying themselves so much... so much so that those who attended have demanded that it is run again next year... Watch this space.

Who has authority? A tricky question for us Brits nowadays. The old authorities have fallen into disrepute – the bankers in the financial crisis; clergy, media figures and even social services in sexual scandal; politicians in both of the above and more. We're rapidly becoming a country that doesn't trust any authority at all.

The Russians, in contrast, have fewer doubts, according to a recent poll asking them to name their highest moral authority. At the bottom, about 1 percent named a revered journalist, a Soviet hockey star, a Chechen leader and the Russian Orthodox Church's Patriarch Kirill. Next up the list came the Defense Minister, scoring 5 percent. In second place, with 9 percent, came Russian cultural figures, such as the novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn. But guess who came top of the list? With 36 percent of the vote, none other than that beacon of morality and personal integrity, President Vladimir Putin, Russia, amazingly, puts a great deal of its trust in the authority of her political establishment.

I want to argue that neither of these positions, whether British scepticism or Russian nationalism, answers the authority question. But for now, let's wind back two thousand years and focus on the situation Matthew describes in Jerusalem.

Jesus has just entered the city. The crowds have welcomed him with palm branches and clothes thrown at his feet. proclaiming him the son of David. He's been into the Temple and caused catastrophe, turning tables and casting out the sellers of sacrificial doves. He has healed the blind and the lame there. The priests are not pleased. They'd managed to get rid of him overnight, but now he's back causing trouble again. So they ask a question, a question of our times just as much as theirs: "what is your authority for doing these things?" You're not one of us, you haven't got the authority of the priestly bloodline. You're not sent by the Romans, you haven't got the imperial authority of Caesar. You're not a demagogue, leading a political body, you haven't got the authority of the people. So whose authority have you got to do these things?

And these of course are questions that we still ask. A lot of people don't trust bloodlines and birthrights; people don't much trust the democratic process or believe that politicians really represent their interests. Sure, a certain level of cynicism is a sign of a healthy society, but it seems nowadays that whenever anyone tries to do anything, the initial response is one of scepticism and distrust. What's in it for you? Why should we trust you? And then scepticism turns into anger and selfrighteousness, like the self-righteousness of the priests in the Temple. We get defensive. Who are you to preach at me? It's easy to see why we want to ask these questions. But the obvious problem with our attitude is that society cannot function without some sort of authority.

Where old authorities are thrown away, new ones quickly arise to fill the vacuum. At an extreme level, we can see this happening in countries like Iraq where old and oppressive political structures are destroyed, and Islamic radicalism comes in with the resources to take over - the so-called Arab Spring is part of the same story. But it happens here, too. Where people come to believe nothing, they will start to believe anything. There are all sorts of people and organisations offering easy answers to difficult questions. You can find your own preferred authority on the Internet, on soap operas, in celebrities, in Tarot or horoscopes, in the BNP - in short, in anything which offers a message conveniently conforming to one's particular prejudices. If nobody's opinion has any authority any more, my opinion is just as valid as anyone else's. no matter how ill-founded and unexamined it might be.

Jesus in the Temple does not offer an easy answer to the question of authority. In fact, when the priests ask him whose authority he works under, Jesus refuses to answer. Instead, he asks them a question about John the Baptist: by whose authority did John baptise? Not from a birthright, not from the Temple. not from Caesar, that much is clear. The priests have accused Jesus of expelling demons using the power of the Devil before, but they are sensible enough not to say that in front of his followers. Nor, though, can they possibly admit the truth, because that would be too much of a challenge to them. The truth is that John baptised by the authority of the one he baptised, Jesus the Messiah. And so it follows that Jesus is acting on no other authority than his own.

That seems straightforward. But before we start thinking that the authority of Jesus gives us an easy solution to the problem, let's think about what Jesus' authority involves. It's the authority of a God who empties Himself of His divinity to be born a baby in a stable. The authority of a God who rides into the city on a donkey, who teaches but never coerces, who refuses to assert that authority but invites us to join Him in His weakness, His self-giving, His humble service to others. The authority of a God crucified who even then makes no show of power but the power of forgiveness and the saving grace of love. It's not the sort of authority the world is looking for, not in ancient Jerusalem, not in sceptical Britain or nationalist Russia. It isn't the authority of a Putin, and it undercuts scepticism with its humility. But it is the authority the world sorely needs.

This is the authority Jesus has given the Church in its action and teaching. It doesn't come from being the Established Church of this country - we can't rely on the gift of Caesar, or rest on our laurels like the priests of the Temple. It doesn't come from the number of bums on pews every Sunday, or the percentage of people who identify themselves as Christian. It's the same authority by which John the Baptist baptised, that is, the paradoxical authority of Christ Himself, the humble authority of selfsacrificial love, of surrendering our lives so that Christ might live in us - the authority of a crucified God: and it is by letting Him act in us and through us that people will see and know and trust Him.

#### In memoriam

"Although you are given a free hand as to method this telegram is not intended to convey the impression that I am not anxious for you to carry out the retirement and you must make every endeavour to do so".

Thus in this notorious telegram replete with double negatives did Field Marshall Sir John French, commander of the British Expeditionary Force communicate his wishes to Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien commander of his II Corps. Yet Smith Dorrien was determined to make a stand, and so it was that the Battle of Le Cateau took place on 26th August 1914. considered the last battle to take place in the tradition of Waterloo. One day

Wonnacott, died, at the age of 19.

later Private Ernest

Ernest had joined the army in Exeter in the years before the war. He was a private in the Royal Army Medical Corps, and was attached to 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion of the Middlesex Regiment when war broke out. Thus he found himself at the centre of the first engagement by British soldiers with the Germans, at the Battle of Mons. The battalion held the station, using their

.303 Lee Enfield rifle to put 15 shots a minute into the equivalent of a two-foot circle of a target 300 yards away. It was no surprise that the Germans thought they were facing machine gun fire. Nevertheless, against the onslaught of the huge

German fighting machine Ernest must have found himself very busy in the hot days of August.

Smith Dorrien pulled back from Mons and in the hope of striking "a stopping blow", made his stand at Le Cateau.

So it was that I, with my wife Sarah, and our two boys Matthew and James, found ourselves in the peaceful quietude of Bethencourt Communal Ceme-

tery at Private Wonnacott's grave. Ernest was the brother of Sarah's great uncle by marriage, so we particularly wanted to mark the exact day one hundred years earlier that he met his death. In this relatively small plot set amidst the family graves of the village, 80 Commonwealth soldiers lie buried. Some from this early

battle, others from October 1918 as the tide of war had turned and it was the German's turn to retreat. Bethencourt, became the site of a German hospital and lies just north of the dead straight road between Cambrai and Le Cateau, north of the more substantial village of Caudry.

As with so many war cemeteries, this is an incredibly peaceful place, only interrupted with the sound of birdsong. Indeed its size and situation makes it perhaps even more affecting than the far larger cemeteries of the Western Front. We certainly found the occasion very moving, just the four of us entirely alone, sharing some words and thoughts about the death of such a young person, one amidst so many.

As for Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien, he has a strong link with Berkhamsted. He is buried in the Three Close Lane Cemetery, and his granddaughter is patron of the Friends of St Peter's.

Although Sir Horace was undoubtedly right to make his stand, and was congratulated by French, the Field Marshall was ultimately never happy with the decision, and Smith Dorrien's dismissal in 1915 was influenced by the battle. If you want to find out more about Mons and Le Cateau, I recommend the appropriate chapter in Richard Holmes' Complete War Walks.



#### Ashridge Estate Winter News



Ashridge is a perfect location for a walk on a beautiful winter's day. Wrap up warm and take in the stunning

surroundings of the National Trust's
Ashridge Estate at this magical time of
year. The leafless trees give you a great
chance to spot deer and flocks of birds
roaming the woods looking for food. If
you would like some inspiration on a new
walk route pop into the Visitor Centre
and we can point you in the right
direction.

#### News from the Estate – Juniper Propagation

Juniper is a native conifer species that is now very rare in the South of England. We have only two mature bushes and two young bushes on the estate. The plant itself provides vital habitat for different species and a food source for migrating birds.

We are undertaking a project to restore the current population and make it sustainable and healthy. This is vital for the biodiversity of the estate and the survival of the species in the South East. We are doing this by using the existing plants as a source of seeds and cuttings. In October the rangers collected 50% of the viable berries from the one fertile female on the estate to be propagated and grown in the tree nursery currently under construction. This is a long term project as juniper berries take two years to mature then the seedlings will be grown for two years in a greenhouse and for a final year in the tree nursery before being planted out.

Early next year we will also take cuttings from both the male and female bushes which will

be grown on for 2 vears in the greenhouse and a further year in the tree nurserv before being planted out. This method is quicker than



collecting seeds; however the new plants will be genetic clones of the parent plant, leaving the population susceptible to infection and disease.

Hopefully through the two methods we can create a sustainable population within 15 years.

Because they care passionately that 300 million children in the developing world go to bed hungry every day and 1.4 billion people live in poverty, Cherry, Sheila, Helen, Anne, Angela and Mike at St Peter's Church, and Julie and Rob at All Saints' Church feel called to do something. What they do as part of their Christian stewardship is act as unpaid volunteers for a Christian organisation which seeks to end poverty through trade, and justice for the poor. Once a month after morning services they share their care by running a regular Traidcraft stall selling Fairtrade goods. Most of these are not found in our local supermarkets, although they hope you

will choose Fairtrade tea, coffee and chocolate when doing your usual shop. Traidcraft is



the largest Fairtrade Company in the UK founded in 1979 as a Christian response to poverty and campaigns tirelessly for poor marginalised producers.

The teams sell a wide range of Fairtrade certified food and crafts grown and produced sustainably to exacting international standards. Other goods without the Fairtrade Mark have not yet obtained international agreement - crafts such as Gospel House jigsaws for instance.

As only 2% of all the sugar and cocoa produced worldwide is Fairtrade, Cherry, Sheila, Helen, Anne, Julie, Mike, Rob and Angela are doing their bit to increase this percentage. Will you help them? If you don't eat chocolate, you could help save the rain forests by buying Fairtrade cleaning products made with Fairtrade Palm Oil and Coconut Oil.

A competition for children to design a Christmas card with prizes for the winning school has a closing date 12th December. Thinking caps on and pencils lined up! A few years ago the Margaret Demidecki Fairtrade prize was won by Victoria First School, to date Berkhamsted's only Fairtrade School.
