Take it with you - litter on our trains

There was a time when you could board a train without being confronted with halffull coffee cups, empty sandwich wrappers, beer cans, banana skins and the like. But sadly, a rubbish-free journey is now a dim and distant memory. When did our trains first become so dirty and littered? I have been travelling up and down the London Midland (formerly Silverlink) line for almost a decade and don't remember it being a problem during the earlier years. However, it is clear that the amount of trash thoughtlessly discarded by passengers is on the increase, and the state of many compartments is a disgrace.

So when and why did it become acceptable to dump your rubbish on the floor, in the gangway or on the empty seat next to you? Does it ever occur to these litterers that their fellow passengers might object to sitting on a seat smeared with food, or by a floor wet from the contents of an upturned takeaway coffee cup, or at a sticky table littered with half-finished drinks and empty crisp packets?

Age, sex and class are no barriers to this anti-social behaviour. There are plenty of so-called 'respectable' middle-aged, middle-class men and women who don't give a second thought about polluting the on board environment. One wonders if the well-worn phrases of the self-centred, entitlement generation are at play here. It's not my job. Someone is paid to do it. And indeed, the train companies do employ hapless souls to dash down the aisles collecting the muck that lazy travellers are too important to have

removed themselves.

But why? By doing this, aren't the companies admitting defeat and saying 'Yes, you are too important to put your own litter in the bins we provide in every compartment, or simply to bag it up and take it with you. We'll get someone else to do it at the end of the line, and in the meantime other paying customers can travel among your filth.'

We are constantly being reminded to take all of our belongings with us when we get off the train, never to leave any items unattended, not to travel unless we have the right ticket for the right class carriage or train service. Would it be so difficult to add to this, please consider other travellers and put your rubbish in the bin or take it with you? If no-one is willing to make the point that this conduct is unacceptable, what incentive is there for people to reflect on their actions and make changes?

On occasion I have pointed out to a passenger that they could choose to put their rubbish in the bin rather than leave it on the seat or floor. But I was recently warned that this could be dangerous — what if I was attacked for challenging someone's misconduct? If it is now the accepted norm to have total disregard for the people we share public spaces with, and to question this puts you in mortal danger, we should all be worried.



Berkhamsted's Heritage Open Days $10^{th} - 13^{th}$ September 2015

For many years now the Berkhamsted Local History & Museum Society has featured Heritage Open Days every September as part of Berkhamsted's heritage calendar. Over the years we have had guided tours of sixteen different sites. Some have been more successful than others and because we want variety we have dropped one or two and almost every year introduced new ones.

Berkhamsted has a rich history and our ideas are not yet exhausted! We are hoping particularly this year to increase the support from schools, especially from the teachers, very few of whom now live locally. A study of the local town and environment

now features in the National Curriculum Quite apart from that it is important to broaden ones horizon beyond the narrow perimeters of a restricted curriculum and encourage observation and the asking of questions.

Spend some time looking at the old photographs all relating to our Town Hall and see the short history of the Market House, the Mechanics' Institute and learn about Edward Buckton Lamb, the architect. How times have changed! You can't go to a Smoking Concert now – you can't even smoke in the building.

Come up to the Common and visit the WWI trenches and see the exhibition of photos of the IOCOTC who trained there before leaving for France. Go up to Ashlyns School and learn what life was like for the children at the Foundling Hospital from 1935-55. From two former foundlings. Make the most of this opportunity, which will not be there forever. Come up to Berkhamsted Place. Yes, the main house was demolished in 1967 but much remains in this secluded place rich with history, successor to the Castle! How well do you really know it and of the history of the building and of the many people of national importance who lived there? Although no longer lived in after 1495 it has had a prominent position in the life of our town to this day. Either before or after visiting St Peter's Church come up Rectory Lane to Rectory Lane Cemetery and see the progress the Friends have made during the last year. Follow some trails and find where your ancestors were buried.


Overall I think War and Peace are two important things. They both give us things we could not live without. Peace gives us happiness, freedom and the right to be

Book Review

Julian Dawson reviews *In the Rooms* by Tom Shone



On the face of it, Tom Shone's novel "In the Rooms" doesn't sound like a whole bundle of laughs. English literary agent Patrick Miller comes to New York following his girlfriend, and hoping to make it big.

Six months later his relationships has finished and he is attempting to sell books he doesn't believe in. However, a chance sighting of legendary novelist Douglas Kelsey brings him into a world of addicts of all descriptions, where he discovers that sobriety gains him excellent networking opportunities and romance.

In point of fact, in places this novel had me laughing out loud on the commute, which on the 8.15 is tantamount to talking loudly in the Bodleian. From apparent darkness, Shone brings a lightness (sorry about that) of touch and emotional attachment to the characters. We engage with Patrick's own journey of discovery, as he confronts his own demons and finally reaches his own truth.

Those of us who know Manhattan would perhaps enjoy this even more, as the author describes it with a fine observation. Having emigrated there from Britain, perhaps there is a touch of the autobiographical about Patrick's experiences in a new city.

A novel about alcoholism might have been a depressing wallow in the failures of humanity, but in Tom Shone's hands we get a touch of cynicism, much satire, and examination of the American Dream. It also asks awkward questions of ourselves. Are we all in denial of our alcoholism? Do we really know ourselves? Through the hilarity shines a very human tale.

Podcast Review

Old Time Radio

In previous columns I've recommended contemporary podcasts of interest but this month we are going to take a journey into the past. Old Time Radio is the name given to what is also often called the 'golden age' of radio broadcasting in the US. It broadly covers the period from the 1920s to 1960. Throughout these decades, radio listening was a favourite indoor pastime of housewives and the young and elderly during the day, and of families in the evenings. There was content to suit all ages and tastes; from comedies to crime dramas, soap operas to news features and documentaries, full cast play and film adaptations to guizzes and game shows. In short, the programmes were not dissimilar to the television shows of today, except it was the audience who supplied the pictures, in their mind's eye.

The majority of this vast radio output is sadly lost forever. Most programmes, particularly before World War II, were broadcast live and no recordings of them were ever made. This also meant that actors would need to do two performances of the same programme in a day – one for the East coast and one for the West. Although prerecorded programming eventually become more common, many recordings were wiped, destroyed or lost over time.

By 1960, television was rapidly growing in popularity, and radio stations switched to airing predominantly music-based programmes. But interest in Old Time Radio persisted and collectors began trading those recordings still in existence. Now, thanks to the internet, many of the surviving radio programmes are available to listen to online for free. These include comedies from the likes of Bob Hope, Groucho Marx and Abbott

and Costello, plays staring greats such as Bette Davies and John Geilgud, and countless entertaining performances by actors who may be less well-known to us today but who were no less talented.

If you have never sampled the delights of Old Time Radio before, a good place to start is the dedicated section of the Internet Archive (https://archive.org/details/oldtimeradio). Here is a selection of recommending listening:

Detective: Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce star as Holmes and Watson in *The New Adventures of Sherlock Holmes*, which originally aired between 1939 and 1947.

Comedy: Film star Eve Arden is *Our Miss Brooks*, a wise-cracking high school teacher who gets herself into any number of scrapes. This show is much funnier than most of the sitcoms you will find on television today.

Mystery: In *The Whistler* the eponymous narrator introduces spooky tales with a twist, not unlike television's *Tales of the Unexpected*.

Plays: The Campbell Playhouse has full cast adaptations of novels such as Les Misérables, Noel Coward's Private Lives and Agatha Christie's The Murder of Roger Ackroyd, all directed and starring Orson Welles. Other notable actors in the series include Laurence Olivier and Katharine Hepburn. The series began with Rebecca, and there is an interview with author Daphne du Maurier at the end of that programme.

Crime: Orson Welles again, this time as host of *The Black Museum* – stories inspired by Scotland Yard's Crime Museum, which houses items of evidence from real-life

Your Berkhamsted Clergy

I saw a picture of the Pope looking at the Turin shroud, maybe the first to see it in its latest exhibition. It reminded me of a book I used to have on the Shroud. I remember the book particularly because it was given as a gift, a present from someone who wanted to say thank you in a practical way. I knew they could not afford it because I had amicably negotiated with several mail order companies to whom the person owed hundreds of pounds and who, between them, wrote off the majority of the debt. The book was "mail-order"!

Debt is certainly in the news as I write. Is it ever out of it? Greece has ratcheted up huge debts. Our own country is heavily indebted. The United States owes billions of dollars. As the world goes round so nations borrow simply to pay the interest on existing debts in a seemingly neverending cycle.

Personally most of us could not manage without going into debt, certainly from time to time. The mortgage, the car, the credit card, the store card, the bill to be paid at the end of the week, even not paying for a meal until you have finished eating it or putting drinks on a tab at the bar, are just a few examples.

It can be no surprise that in first century Palestine debt was also a major topic of the day. As an agricultural country people borrowed against the next year's harvest, and if that did not produce enough the cycle of debt began. Quite a few of Jesus stories are about debt. People are threatened with slavery, or prison, violence or exclusion if they do not pay. The uncomfortable message that comes through is that in the end if debt cannot be paid it has to be forgiven, written off. "Forgive us our debts as we forgive those

who are indebted to us", is the ultimate prayer.

Of course, that seems no practical way to manage. Scoundrels would be borrowing like fury, living the life of Riley, knowing that they would never have to pay. However, the responsibility is twofold. Borrowers borrow on the understanding they will pay back, but they pay interest which covers not iust the cost to the lender but more (sometimes lots more) as a kind of insurance against default. When payment is made the lender makes his profit. Lenders, on the other hand, take a risk which is why they are paid more than they lend. If you make a mistake and lend to a person who cannot, or will not, pay you back you lose your money. That is well understood in everyday life and in organisations like the Stock Market. When lenders will not shoulder their responsibility, take the losses arising from their decisions to lend in the first place big problems arise, as do those when borrowers will not or cannot pay.

Forgiveness may seem to be no way to do business or run the global economy, but in the end it may well be the only reality. Debts can become too big ever to be paid off and will have to be written off somehow or other. Catastrophic inflation is the worst way of down-sizing debt as it leads to huge social problems.

Forgiveness is the quality which leads to new life for both borrowers and lenders. And it is not only to do with money but with the whole of life. It is a fundamental Christian insight. This is why those, however wealthy or poor, who have the mind set of someone who owes finds it Gospel, good news.

A trip to Camp Nou

amazing, aside from looking out onto the pitch, was getting to see the five Champions League trophies Barcelona have won. As well as that I got to see the various Golden Boots and Ballon d'Or's (World Player of the Year) trophies that the great Lionel Messi has won.

If it couldn't already be seen, then the trophies and history on show gave a clear

indication of just how incredible Barcelona is as a football club. Simply being at their stadium made you appreciate how amazing the club is and what it must mean for a player to be a part of it. I'm a football fanatic and I have to admit that I did have goose bumps when I first saw the pitch.

Barcelona's ground wasn't all just about football though. The village situated outside the ground consisted of various food

courts and the official store covered 3 floors! In one part of the area where the Nou Camp is situated, there is the Palau Blaugrana arena which is home to Barcelona's basketball, handball, ice-hockey and futsal teams. Their trophies were also all displayed in the Barcelona museum.

It was a great day out and if anyone is planning on visiting Barcelona then I'd recommend this tour to any football fan!

Did you know?

Origin of the town's name

Berkhamsted

The earliest recorded spelling of the town's name is the 10th century Anglo-Saxon Beorhðanstædæ. The first part originates from the Old Celtic word Bearroc, meaning "hilly place"; or alternatively it may originate from the Old English words beorg, meaning "hill", or berc or beorc, meaning "birch". The latter part, "hamsted", derives from the Old English word for homestead, and thus the town can be understood as either the "homestead amongst the hills" or the "homestead among the birches".

Local historian Percy Birtchnell identified over 50 different spellings and epithets for the town's name since the writing of the Domesday Book; the present spelling was adopted in 1937. Other spellings included: "Berkstead", "Berkampsted", "Berkhampstead", "Muche Barkhamstede", "Berkhamsted Magna", "Great Berkhamsteed" and "Berkhamstead". The town's local nickname is "Berko".
