Rambles from Berkhamsted by Julian Dawson



The world of social media has changed our views on achievement. and YouTube in particular is creating new stars who in turn start appearing on more main stream channels such as the BBC's Strictly Come Dancing. pulselive.co.ke explains how KSI, otherwise known as Olajide "JJ" William Olatunji pioneered YouTube celebrity boxing matches after making a name for himself playing FIFA on a games platform. Berkhamsted School educated Olatunji will be going head to head in a professional boxing bout in a rematch with vlogger Logan Paul at the Staples Corner venue in Los Angeles. It is a somewhat surreal leap from gaming and vlogging to the boxing ring. But since KSI has 20.5 million subscribers with estimated earnings of £1.5 million his influence is not to be dismissed lightly, and I certainly wouldn't want to pick a fight. newsamed.com also picks up on this story mentioning that KSI was schooled alongside Simon Minter at Berkhamsted, who has made his name as miniminter on YouTube. KSI consolidated his fame by earning the NME Award for Vlogger of the Year in 2016, and alongside his brother was considered the most influential

YouTube creator back in 2015. In 2018 he challenged Piers Morgan to generate the most tweets in an hour, which KSI satisfyingly won easily by 4000. And as I write this piece, overnight it transpires that KSI was victorious in his bout over Paul.

Continuing the somewhat surreal air of this week's column, Berkhamsted School also appeared in the hampshirechronicle.co.uk. Graham Greene Birthplace Trust launches Graham Greene Film Review Competition

The Graham Greene Birthplace Trust invites entries for the inaugural Graham Greene Film Review Competition. Organised in partnership with The Centre for New Writing at Manchester University, this competition commemorates Graham Greene's legacy as a film reviewer by offering a cash prize of £500 for the most imaginative, original, and thought-provoking review submitted.

Giles Clark, Chair of the Graham Greene Birthplace Trust, explains: "The Graham Greene Film Review Competition has been created to further enhance Greene's reputation and widen knowledge of his work. We have chosen to make this a prize specifically for film reviewing because films are a popular medium for the younger generation, some of whom may not know Greene's work, while among the older generation who may be familiar with his novels, Greene's superb body of film criticism may be unknown. We hope that the competition will attract many entries from up-and-coming writers as well as more established talents."

The Competition for the Graham Greene Film Review Prize is open to anyone aged 18 or over at the time of entry. The closing date for submissions is 5:00 pm (UK time) on 31 March 2020. International entries are welcome.

To enter the Competition, entrants must submit a review of a film (documentary or otherwise) with a run time of at least 80 minutes. The word limit for submissions is 1000 words. Entries must be in English. The entrance fee is £10 per submission.

The winner of the Competition will be announced at the end of May 2020 and the winning entry subsequently published in *The Manchester Review*. The winning entry will also be showcased at the 22nd annual Graham Greene International Festival, to be held in Graham Greene's native town of Berkhamsted in October 2020.

Observations by Dennis Furnell (The Natureman)

Christmas seems to come round earlier each year; something I find rather unsettling, particularly as I am a fan of the festive season. It's a time when all sorts of creatures seem to be celebrating this most important of religious festivals. Top of the list must be the robin in all its guises; some figuratively accurate and others not so much! And plants such as holly, mistletoe and ivy have been important religious symbols for thousands of years.

Other wildlife too are significant at this time of year. It may have been 8,000 years or more since reindeer ceased to be part of the fauna of these islands, yet here they are pulling Santa's sledge as though they were part of our native fauna. There are, of course, several farmed herds of reindeer in the UK, animals brought over from the high arctic. We do have our species of deer such as red deer and fallow that we count as being native, but it seems no one has attempted to usurp the reindeer's hold as a motive power for special Christmas deliveries.

The subject of deer and their place in the local wildlife, is not only pertinent during the festive season. We are fortunate to have several large estates like Woburn and Ashridge nearby where substantial herds of several species of deer thrive. Indeed, Woburn supports a large number of different deer species and the fallow deer at Ashridge are at their very best at the moment; the bucks, resplendent with their palmate antlers, are holding court to the elegant females.

However, there is a deer, whose presence, particularly in our gardens, sometimes goes unnoticed until, that is, the rose bushes show signs of selfpruning. The culprit is a small shy deer from south east Asia, "Reeve's Muntjac". They were introduced at the turn of the century into several estates, particularly Woburn, but have spread out to cover much of the country and, if you have productive fruit trees in the garden, you will be very popular. Overall, these deer are about the size of a medium-sized dog, say a Labrador. Muntjac are never seen in herds like fallow or red deer. they are family creatures so a male and female and perhaps a couple of well-grown young is the most you will see together.

As the nights lengthen, so the chance of seeing one of these attractive creatures increases, often dashing across country lanes and showing up in the car headlights. They are an odd shape in that their hind quarters are more robust and somewhat longer than

their front legs and even on level ground they look as if they are running downhill.

It's best to slow down should you see one cross in front on the road as when one of the family crosses there's a good chance that the rest will follow.

The female in my picture does not have horns, just a couple of bumps on her skull. Her mate sports two spiky horns, but they don't indicate an aggressive nature; the horns are used as a tool to mark the bark of bushes and small trees. The male rubs scent from a gland on his head to mark his territory. Secretive creatures, only when the male is defending his territory, or if frightened will he make a loud bark, half-way in tone between that of a dog and a fox. A gentle deer, they are very much at home with humanity.

Our Clergy



By the time you are reading this article Christmas will have begun in Berkhamsted. The Christmas tree and street lights

will have been illuminated, the shops will be full of Christmas gifts and produce and there will be a general buzz about the town as we draw closer to Christmas Day. Also, St Peter's contribution to the Festival of Light will have taken place with large numbers of people coming into the church to experience the sacred space of the church lit by hundreds of small candles and tea lights. I first experienced this wonderful initiative last year and was so impressed at such a simple idea as lighting the church with candles. The candlelit church offered something additional to the busyness of the Christmas street market and that was stillness and peace, which seems to have spoken to those who visited the church.

Stillness and silence is a rarity in our towns and cities with so much noise around us. In the Christian tradition, and indeed in the practices of other faiths, there is the custom of a retreat, going away to a quiet place to unwind, to be still and silent and to become more aware of the presence

of God and allowing that divine presence to fill your heart and mind. For Christians going on retreat usually means going to a monastery or convent or some special place where stillness is to be found and experienced. One of the most famous Christian retreat practices is a 30 day silent retreat following the spiritual exercises of Ignatius Loyola, a 16th century priest, theologian and founder of the Society of Jesus. This particular retreat is not for the fainthearted but those who have experienced it will all agree it is personally and spiritually transformative.

The theme of silence and stillness often appears in many Christmas carols and music generally. The reason for this may be that when Jesus was born, this was the moment in the history of the world when God invisible made himself visible, coming among us in Jesus to share our human life. It is as if the world at that moment stood still, acknowledging the wonderful mystery that was being unfolded. This is what lies behind the act of bowing or genuflecting during the recitation of the Nicene Creed when the words 'was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man' are said. For a moment there is a pause, reminding us of that divine moment when God came among us.

Many of us will light candles in our homes at Christmas and they add something special to the celebrations. Why not try at some point during Christmas to find a quiet spot at home (if that is at all possible) and sit before a single lit candle. Allow the silent flickering flame to still you, allow the light of the flame to remind you of the one who came among us as the 'light of the world' and invites us to reflect the light of his love in our lives.



We watch the build up to December 25th from the eyes of one very excited boy, but whilst the day begins well when it finally arrives, the whole family shed tears before supper, until one final moment of genuine moral propaganda, in which it becomes clear that what you eat, where you are and what presents you get doesn't matter; it's who you're with that really counts.

Home Alone (1991) - "He's not scary after all."

As if being left alone over Christmas wasn't bad enough, Kevin McCallister (Macaulay Culkin) is also terrified of a crazy old man who wears a big coat and shovels snow suspiciously. And who wouldn't be. That is until the guy turns out to be a genuinely lovely pensioner who regrets mistakes he made with his own family. Cue tear-jerking moment in a church where the two finally talk and a choir sings *Silent Night*.

Easy Fruit Cake



With Christmas not far away many of us will be thinking of fruit cake. This is a very easy version with few ingredients but a great result.

Serves 12

Ingredients

1kg dried mixed fruit
1 heaped tsp mixed spice

250g self-raising flour 500ml pure orange juice

Method

Place fruit and orange juice into a large bowl. Stir well, cover and leave to soak overnight in the fridge. Next day, preheat oven to 150C / Gas 2. Line a loaf tin with baking parchment. Add the 250g of self-raising flour and mixed spice to the soaked fruit. Stir thoroughly by hand or with a cake mixer. Tip the cake mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 2 hours. If the cake looks like it's browning too fast, cover with foil or brown paper and continue to cook until it is springy to the touch. Cool completely and keep in a tin for up to two weeks.

Circular from Great Gaddesden to Little Gaddesden Introduction to Walk 2795

Region - Chilterns

County/Area - Hertfordshire

Author - Donald Morton **Length** - 7.5 miles / 12.2 km

Ascent - 770 feet / 233 metres

Grade - easy/mod

This Hertfordshire walk starts from a dirt layby on the A4146 (Grid ref TL030116), the Hemel Hempstead to Leighton Buzzard Road. The layby is opposite 4 blocks of houses on the right hand side of the road coming from Hemel Hempstead just after passing the turning signed to Great Gaddesden and with a large Wyvale Garden Centre notice. Coming from Leighton Buzzard after passing the crossroads with lanes going off to Little Gaddesden and Studham look out for Bradden Lane on the left: the houses are soon after on the left with the layby opposite.

Start the walk through the kissing gate at the Hemel Hempstead end of the layby, signed Hertfordshire Way. Go across the field and over a long wooden bridge over the river Gade and a patch of swampy ground. Once over the bridge bear left and emerge through another kissing gate by a childrens' play area. This is Great Gaddesden: it is the parish which is bigger in area; as a village it is much smaller than Little Gaddesden which was a "company town" for the Ashridge estate. Turn left along the road, pass the school, ignore a road on the right and come to a T junction. Turn right and go up the lane past some typical redbrick and timber houses. Pass the lane to the right signed to St Margarets and continue along this quiet lane for about 1km, up over Piper's Hill and down into the pretty little village of Nettleden. You come out in front of the church and turn right along the road for a few yards before turning left up a road marked unsuitable for motor vehicles.

The road soon becomes a track, ascending in a walled ravine under a bridge to emerge at the top of the hill, and then descending to the hamlet of Frithsden. You emerge into Frithsden itself by the Alford Arms. Cross the road and go up the slightly stepped track through woods. Continue on this track until you come out onto a drive to the left of a large house. Cross the drive, go through a barrier and continue along an enclosed path between gardens. At the end go through another barrier, at crossing paths turn right and then right again to emerge - with a green on the right and a hole on the left -at the golf course which originated on Berkhamsted Common in the 1880s.


Take the path between tee and hole and then, with due consideration to the golfers, skirt the right hand side of the course along the backs of gardens. This is the route of the Hertfordshire Way. It soon plunges into a narrow strip of woodland between the fairway and the gardens. It is actually a bridle way so, although it maybe muddy, it is easy to follow out to a road (Grid ref TL005096). Cross the road and continue diagonally right across the fairway watch out to the left before crossing - towards a line of trees: hoof marks in the grass define the line. At the far side continue through the trees with the golf course now on both sides. The path through the trees ends with hole 6 on the right and tee 7 on the left. Follow the bridle path straight on - muddy in winter but possible to find parallel tracks. The muddiest part terminates at a finger post at crossing bridle paths. Again go straight on through gorse bushes and down a broad grass avenue between woods. On the right are Frithsden Beeches - ancient woodland with National Trust signs warning of the danger from falling branches: it is not unusual to see deer hereabouts.

The grass avenue ends with Brickkiln Cottage on the left. You now leave the Hertfordshire Way to turn right down a gravel drive with Frithsden Beeches on the right and a wide open grassy space on left. Follow the drive down to the road. Turn left along the road and in about 100yards or so pass "Charnis" and then turn right up a footpath and permissive bridle path - Gaddesden 1 mile. Where the ways fork, keep left past "Rodinghead" and continue down an enclosed footpath with wide expansive views to the right. At the end go through a kissing gate and straight on over a wide field to a gate in a fence. Through this and you are at the end of Golden Valley. Cross to the other side and to the left of a water treatment plant find a broad gravel track. Follow this up behind the plant and as it swings left to come out a road (Grid ref TL001122). This is the outskirts of Great Gaddesden; the main part of the village stretches as a strip along the road to the left for about 2 miles. Cross the road to the pavement and turn right. Go past Ashridge Cottages 1929 and opposite Cromer Close turn left down a footpath, signed to Nettleden. You have now rejoined the Hertfordshire Way which will take you back to the start. Go right diagonally across the field and through a gate, at the top of a valley, into an enormous field under cultivation. The footpath is apparently not restored after ploughing or planting and there are no waymarks. However, other walkers will probably have come this way to show the route which goes straight on descending down the valley bottom. Look out for an isolated clump of trees up to the left. When you come level with it this is where you leave the path which goes on to Nettleden (Grid ref TL007118). Turn left at right angles to your previous direction to go up hill to pass to the left of the trees. There may be a small pile of stones to mark the junction of the two paths but there is no waymark. Again other walkers will probably have pioneered the trail. But if you cannot discern one, once you have passed the

trees, bear diagonally right aiming for the tallest trees to the right of a white house. When you arrive, you will discover that they surround a small pond: skirt this to come out at track.

Turn right and go along this track for about 1km. On the right you will come to buildings behind a wall including what look like accommodation huts. They possibly are, for this is Amavarati Buddhist Temple which offers contemplative retreats. Opposite to these take a footpath to the left signed Great Gaddesden. An enclosed path round the edge of the field exits through a kissing gate into a field. Cross this past a clump of trees on the left, go through a gate and hedge gap and straight on to the opposite corner of the field (at the corner of the grounds of the 12th century church). Turn left past garages, then right through a small estate to arrive back at the kissing gate by the children's play area. From here back over the water meadows to the start.

Recycling your (real) Xmas tree

What do you do with your Christmas tree after the festivities have finished? For those who choose a synthetic tree, it will be back in the box until next year. But for many others who have bought a farm-grown tree, it's a tricky decision - a choice of leaving the tree outside or squeezing it into a green wheelie bin, which Dacorum Council will only collect in March.

To encourage tree recycling, Dacorum's waste services team are again setting up a shredding machine, in Water Lane Car Park, Berkhamsted for one day only: Sunday 5th January 2020. The pine trees are chipped, and these natural chippings are then used to keep council flower beds weed-free across the borough. Helping local citizens to recycle their Christmas trees are the various Scout Groups from round Berkhamsted and Northchurch, co-ordinated by the 1st Berkhamsted Scout Group. 1st Berkhamsted Group has organised a tree-collection service for over 10 years, where Christmas trees are picked up from people's houses and taken to the shredding site.

"The shredding day is popular, and there is often a queue to drop off a tree", says Paul Chambers, 1st Berkhamsted Scout Leader. "We save people time by taking their tree for them in our large vans, which cuts the number of individual car trips to the shredder. It's better for the environment, and you don't have to spend ages clearing pine needles from the back of your car!"

Since launching the service in 2009, the local Scouts have helped to transport more than 6,000 Christmas trees for shredding. The charity suggests a minimum voluntary contribution of £4 per tree collected. The collection service involves over 80 volunteers and includes Scouts of all ages. It has sponsorship from local organisations including Bill's restaurant, S Dell & Sons Removals, and Berkhamsted School.

The funds raised go towards equipment and activities for the children, maintenance of the Scout Huts, and financial support for trips and expeditions for the various local Scout groups.

'It is a significant group effort with many volunteers and local businesses providing support, but we are proud of the community service we provide', says Geoff Halls, 1st Berkhamsted Group Scout Leader.

The tree collection service is available for addresses in the Berkhamsted town and Northchurch areas.

From the 1^{st} December, tree collections can be booked and paid for in advance at www.1stberkhamsted.org.uk/trees. The deadline for online bookings is midnight, 3rd January. Alternatively, between 9-3pm on Saturday 4^{th} January, customers can buy a pre-paid collection tag (cash or card accepted) at the Scout Christmas tree stall on Berkhamsted High Street.


