


In this month's column, as Julian Dawson is on a well deserved holiday, we are publishing his best bits from previous issues!



October 2014:A grave beginning to the postsummer column. hemeltoday.co.uk reports on the Friends of St Peter's initiative to restore the Three Close Lane Cemetery, behind the Rex Cinema. Berkhamsted's Heritage Open Days $10^{th} - 13^{th}$ September 2015

For many years now the Berkhamsted Local History & Museum Society has featured Heritage Open Days every September as part of Berkhamsted's heritage calendar. Over the years we have had guided tours of sixteen different sites. Some have been more successful than others and because we want variety we have dropped one or two and almost every year introduced new ones.

Berkhamsted has a rich history and our ideas are not yet exhausted! We are hoping particularly this year to increase the support from schools, especially from the teachers, very few of whom now live locally. A study of the local town and environment

now features in the National Curriculum Quite apart from that it is important to broaden ones horizon beyond the narrow perimeters of a restricted curriculum and encourage observation and the asking of questions.

Spend some time looking at the old photographs all relating to our Town Hall and see the short history of the Market House, the Mechanics' Institute and learn about Edward Buckton Lamb, the architect. How times have changed! You can't go to a Smoking Concert now – you can't even smoke in the building.

Come up to the Common and visit the WWI trenches and see the exhibition of photos of the IOCOTC who trained there before leaving for France. Go up to Ashlyns School and learn what life was like for the children at the Foundling Hospital from 1935-55. From two former foundlings. Make the most of this opportunity, which will not be there forever. Come up to Berkhamsted Place. Yes, the main house was demolished in 1967 but much remains in this secluded place rich with history, successor to the Castle! How well do you really know it and of the history of the building and of the many people of national importance who lived there? Although no longer lived in after 1495 it has had a prominent position in the life of our town to this day. Either before or after visiting St Peter's Church come up Rectory Lane to Rectory Lane Cemetery and see the progress the Friends have made during the last year. Follow some trails and find where your ancestors were buried.

Berkhamsted Place was built by Sir Edward Carey in the reign of Elizabeth I using material from the Castle. From the 18th century onwards it was frequently referred to as the Castle. Little remains of the Mansion but the area is rich in history. The Barn probably pre-dates the house.

Berkhamsted Castle tours at 10.30am,12.30pm, 3pm. This is the best remaining motte and bailey castle in the country and has many royal associations. 16 display panels on its history and connections with the town in the Castle Visitor Room

St Peter's Church and Court House. Tours at 3pm. The church was consecrated in 1222 and has many fine monuments. The Court House is Tudor.

Ashlyn's School, the former Foundling Hospital, open 1pm-5.30pm.

Tours at 1.30pm and 3.30pm, led by former foundlings. A DVD and small exhibition is included. Fine stained glass and many monuments from the original London Foundling Hospital in the Chapel.

Rectory Lane Cemetery, open 1.30pm-6pm. Guided tours at 2pm, 3pm, 4pm. Small exhibition on the cemetery's history; WWI and local notables' trails, update on the RLC Project, help with genealogy enquiries and 'Find a Grave'. Activities for children.

Response from Vernon Mildew's 'Take it with you—Litter on our trains

Dear Editor,

I started commuting to London in 1964 and still travel to Euston from time to time. In those days one had breakfast before leaving home. There was nowhere on the station or indeed on the way to the station to buy coffee, croissants etc at 7:30 in the morning. People did not carry water bottles that they then left on the seat next to them. There were no free newspapers at the station to read and discard on the train. I think that people could be shamed into not doing the antisocial things that Vernon Mildew mentions.

Some of us are so fed up with the way that a minority are trashing our beautiful town that we started the Berkhamsted Litter Pickers about six years ago.

We have more than 100 volunteers regularly clearing the litter off many of the residential streets of the town. We leave the High Street to the professionals. The idea is that, if people regularly clear their own street, it might just stay that way. Two councillors have given us money from their community funds to buy litter pick sticks and Hi-Vis vests. Your Berkhamsted Clergy

Since my last letter, we have had the Petertide Fayre and so my opening remarks must be of thanks, thanks to all who organised the event and managed the stalls and all that goes with that, but also for the many who, in spite of the rain, came and spent money! It was a good day indeed.

This month also marks the beginning of a new academic term for many of our young people, be it at pre-school, infant and primary or senior school, along with those who will be leaving home for university for the first time, to say nothing of anxious parents who have to loosen the ties of parenthood somewhat. Amongst the comings and goings here at St Peter's in July we bade farewell to Alice Christoffi our intern student whom we share with the chaplaincy of Berkhamsted School. In her place we welcome Lex who will be working with our younger people and in our infant and junior schools.

I really enjoy this September month when the hint of summer remains, I hope, but then the leaves begin to change, a sign of the seasons moving on, all part of the rhythm of life isn't it? And it is so with ourselves, is it not? Life, it would seem, has its seasons. Our hearts, interwoven with spring and autumn, winter and summer, beat warm, then heavy, and our moods would follow the flow of the sea. It's all so complex, beyond us, and yet so simple: An eternal rhythm, a repetition, living then dying, and then, a break in the rhythm, a surprising freshness, living anew. It's a mystery, a wonder, so unbelievable, this life! And yet....and yet.....As storms and rain follow sunshine, so too our lives cloud over with the pain

of broken relationships, of illness and of course, with the death of our loved ones. And here at St Peter's we have recently had a number of deaths of faithful men and women, something which still affects me even after thirty years as a priest.

Such repetition, of sunshine and storm, of good times and bad, may lull us into a kind of negative fatalism, we give up the little Faith we once had. Just two years ago my mother died after Alys and myself had nursed her through a seven week illness, never leaving her bedside. Watching and waiting for death to come certainly tried my faith and led to a long dark night of the soul when God seemed totally absent, when prayer simply dried up. The sad fact is that many people feel that they dare not admit such things to themselves or to God, let alone to one another. How on earth can we carry on? On my pilgrim journey I have drawn upon the resources of a 20th century Dutch priest and author, Henri Nouwen, who once wrote:

Are the darkness and dryness of my prayer signs of God's absence, or are the signs of presence deeper and wider than the senses can contain? Is the death of my prayer the end of my intimacy with God or the beginning of a new communion, beyond words, emotions and bodily sensations?

From: The Heart of Henri Nouwen, page 96.

In the midst of darkness, Nouwen found light, He clung on to the hope that God was still with him and that no matter what was happening, it could and would lead him to a greater intimacy with God.

Your Berkhamsted Clergy, cont

Mother Teresa also experienced a similarly dark season when she found that she lost that intimacy with Jesus she once felt so deeply:

In my heart there is no faith, no love, no trust. There is so much pain, the pain of longing, the pain of not being wanted. I want God with all the powers of my soul and yet there is between us a terrible separation.

From: Come, Be My Light, page 192.

So the message is????? Be honest with God, do not be afraid to pray "God, why the distance?" Hang on in there because God never deserts us. It is part of the human experience as God seeks to bring is to greater maturity in Jesus Christ that we have these dry, barren periods. There may well come a time when we have to let go of the false idea that we should experience the warmth, the closeness, the glory of God every time we pray. There are these comings and goings with God on the Christian journey, changes in our relationship with Him, just as the seasons change. After the darkness there is light, sometimes glimpsed in the darkness as a tiny pin prick. Jesus Christ has experienced all of this. The darkness of death gives way to the bright light of the resurrection. He is our hope, enough to walk the next few steps of life. Just hang on in there: don't give up on God for God never gives up on us. The Christian life is one of constant new beginnings. Yours in Christ,





My Experience

I chose the classic pub favourite the signature 30-day dry-aged Irish heritage fillet steak, with pepper sauce. As you can see from the picture, this was well presented and as with any good steak the knife cuts through very easily.



I accompanied my steak with chips and rocket and parmesan salad. I was very pleased with myself for not choosing a starter only because the main course was so filling.

Though I did indulge in a dessert, this being the Summer berry savarin, strawberry sauce, creme ChantillyV. I can only describe this as a sponge soaked in syrup with a generous serving of tangy fruit. Very yummy!

As well as enjoying all the courses, the staff made the experience a pleasure with their professional approach.

Average spend £20/£25

One of the joys of having friends living far & wide is that you get to visit the gardens in their locality. The Old Vicarage Gardens in East Ruston, Norfolk is on the edge of the universe as far as I'm concerned & a difficult place to visit which means it's been on my list of places to go for about twenty years & I've never managed to get there until this summer. One of my best friends lives in Bury, Suffolk so it was still another couple of hours on from her place to Fast Ruston, Undaunted & cameras charged we set off on a beautiful sunnv day, (the only one we had in August) & landed at The Old Vicarage Gardens at 1pm opening time.

Alan Gray and Graham Robeson have been owners of the gardens for 40 years. When they arrived there were no gardens & they have worked meticulously to re-establish lost wildlife & areas full of horticultural diversity. Sections of the gardens are planted with roses, exotics, Dutch style planting, herbs, desert plants, vegetables & cut flowers & fortunately for us on the day there was shade to be had in the woodland garden where a terrific collection of hydrangeas thrived.

One area close to the house had the most beautiful collection of echeverias & succulents...whether they were taken into a greenhouse for the winter or draped with fleece I didn't ask but they looked good & strong & most at home.

No fine upstanding garden that hawks visitors is complete without a tea shop. The Old Vicarage didn't disappoint; the cakes were all homemade & the tea served in a proper pot. The plant shop sold a huge healthy array of plant specimens that grew in the gardens & I also spotted a shed that displayed some interesting old tools.

I reckon if I lived closer I would've trundled along to one of their open evenings to see the gardens at dusk. Also, I've noticed from their website they hold flower arranging & painting classes along with Gardener's Question Time & Summer Parties. East Ruston could be a good locality for a short break-there is a great beach very close & a lighthouse too. Everyone loves a lighthouse.

A pitch with a view

Last month a brand new stand was completed at Berkhamsted's 3G astro facility at Ashlyns School. The facility is known to many as simply BerkoAstro, and with the new stand parents and supporters will be able to watch proceedings from a greater vantage point than beforehand.

Previously there had been a large metallic green face obstructing your view, as you'd either have to stand behind that or on the sideline itself in order to enjoy the football that was taking place. With the new stand you'll now be able to watch the play from an enhanced view as 'The pitch with a view' project is now fully completed.

The new stand will accommodate 100 plus people and will aim to draw more parents and fans alike to the astro itself when a game or a training session is happening. The stand is situated on the half way line of the pitch and therefore presents onlookers with a great view of the wonderful facility. To coincide with that, new fencing and railing has been installed and restored to enhance the experience for spectators.

I spoke to Berkhamsted Raiders chairman Keith Pollard about the new stand and how the project came about. He explained that the board of Trustees who represent Raiders and Ashlyns and actually run BerkoAstro
"decided to invest some of the surplus"
which was generated from the facility
throughout the last year into "improving
the venue for spectators"

Berkhamsted Raiders are massively keen on fundraising and that's how some of the funding was raised when BerkoAstro was originally built. Keith went on to say that "Raiders has also raised significant funds for the development [of the new stand] through events such as the Berkhamsted Fun Run and Half Marathon." Those events saw many Raiders parents and players run to raise money for not just the new stand, but also for a charity called 'Cardiac Risk in the Young.'

Keith also told me of the benefits that will be reaped from the new stand explaining that it "will increase the enjoyment of football for all involved" whilst it will also make the astro "more marketable for 11 v 11 games, 7 v 7 games and all training sessions."

Donations towards the new stand are still being accepted and at the time of writing sponsorship has almost reached £4000.
